Subject Overview

Celtic Civilisation is the study of the legacy of the Celts in the world, from when we first encounter the Celts in history, to recent times. We examine the formation of the peoples and nations of Ireland, Northern and Western Britain and France in the early Middle Ages, and study aspects of their civilisation in early-modern and modern Europe. This subject examines the history, archaeology, languages, literatures, mythologies and cultures of the Celts.

Celtic Civilisation is offered by Roinn na Gaeilge as part of the BA (Joint Honours) programme, but is also available as an optional subject on a number of denominated degree programmes including the Bachelor of Arts (English and Creative Writing), Bachelor of Arts (Drama, Theatre and Performance Studies), and the Bachelor of Arts with Children's Studies.

Course Outline

First Year

In first year you study modules covering the ancient and medieval history of the Celts, the archaeology of the Celts, introducing the medieval literature of Ireland and Wales and the mythology and folklore of the Celts.

Second and Final Year

In the second and final year of the programme, you may choose from a wide range of modules covering many aspects of the medieval society and literature of the Celtic peoples, as well as studying Welsh or medieval Irish language. You may also choose from a selection of relevant modules in Archaeology, History, Classics and English. All Irish and Welsh literature is studied in translation and no previous knowledge of any Celtic language is required.
