Course Overview

History is first and foremost about people, the forces that shaped their lives and the ways in which they changed their societies. Studying history makes us aware that our world today took on its current appearance less by chance than as a result of specific developments and decisions taken in the past.

The BA (History) is a four-year degree that offers you choice and flexibility in what and how you study. It enables you to combine your study of History (your 'major') with two other subjects (your 'minors') that complement your major: choose from Journalism and Global Media, Sociological and Political Studies, Economics, Philosophy, French, German and Italian.



The BA History prepares students for careers in the public and private sectors, including international development, the diplomatic and civil service, NGOs, journalism, publishing, marketing and media, the heritage industry, and education.

Study Abroad and Work Placement Opportunities

In Year Three, students may apply to study abroad for an academic year or semester in a partner university or undertake a single semester work placement. Work placements include community, industry and on campus opportunities. Study abroad and work placements are competitive and subject to availability.

History students acquire a wide range of skills and qualities that are valuable in many professions. The combination of information analysis, research and other skills are highly sought after by many sectors of employment. These skills include:

- Appreciation of the social, cultural and political context of historical interpretation
- Use of methodologies to collect, quantify, analyse and interpret data
- Critical thinking techniques
- Appreciation and understanding of the complexity of events and processes, especially in relation to changes over time
- Formulation of logical arguments supported by evidence

- Communication skills oral and written
- IT, information retrieval and presentation skills
- Research skills and teamwork skills
- Sensitivity to different cultures and can deal with new situations
- Self-discipline, self-direction, independence of mind and initiative, alongside an ability to work with others

Work experience is also a key issue and any experience you have to add to your CV will be a bonus. Volunteering is also an excellent way of adding experience to your CV.
