


### 6 Main Branches of Philosophy:

creation,


Concepts: beauty, art, inspiration, taste creativity, perception, authenticity











#### ETHICS: The study of moral systems - defining, defending and recommending sets of moral values or perspectives.






#### **Political Philosophy:**

**David Miller defines political** philosophy as: 'philosophical reflection on how best to arrange our collective life – our political institutions and our social practices, such as our economic system and our pattern of family life....seek to establish basic principles that will, for instance, justify a particular form of state, show that individuals have certain inalienable rights, or tell us how a society's material resources should be shared among its members...

Concepts: Freedom justice, authority, law, citizenship, economy, equality, rights, duties, obligations, democracy, power, welfare, priority.



Logic: What is an argument? How do we tell good arguments from bad arguments? How do we learn to think well?



#### Tutorials (online):

#### Group advisory sessions (face-to-face or online)

- Each first year student will be assigned to a small group that will meet a staff member three times during the semester. We encourage students from the small groups to continue interaction within their groups throughout the semester and suggest a voluntary self-guided programme of shared activities for the groups.

- 3 group advisory sessions (face-to-face) per semester


