<p>Orientation Programs</p>	<p>All exchange students (regardless of immigration status) are required to attend our mandatory on-campus international orientation program. Law exchange students may need to arrive earlier for the Law School’s orientation program prior to international orientation. Academic Information

<p>Educational Style</p>	<p>Many exchange students are surprised by the differences between the educational style of their home country and the University of Richmond.</p> <p>One of the most obvious distinctions is the method of teaching. There is continuous assessment in each class. Professors provide students with a detailed course syllabus for each course. The syllabus details when exams, papers, class presentations, readings and homework assignments are due. Usually there is an assignment due each class meeting. Students are expected to participate in class discussions. In fact, class participation is</p>
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	<p>often calculated as part of the grade a student earns in a course. Attendance is always expected and, in some cases, required. For those who do not attend class according to the attendance policy, there may be a penalty on the final grade.</p> <p>The University of Richmond offers undergraduate courses at levels 100 - 400. Not all courses are offered every semester and the level of difficulty of any given course is determined by each individual academic department. For example, some departments consider upper-level courses at the 200 level while other departments have 300 level classes available for freshman and sophomores. Students should check the online course description using the link above as well as any required pre-requisite course(s) listed. For further information, students can contact the International Education Office or may need to contact the respective department chair for more information.</p>
Minimum course load per semester	3.5 units (undergraduate); 9.0 credits (graduate and law)
Restricted programs for exchange students	Course numbers ending in "U" are offered by the School of Continuing Studies. These courses may not meet home institution degree requirements, are not available for undergraduates until arrival at Richmond, and will require special approval for registration. Business exchange students are NOT permitted to take courses in the School of Continuing Studies.

Course Registration	<p>Online course catalog: http://registrar.richmond.edu/catalogs/index.html <i>Please note: not all courses listed in the catalog are offered every semester</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• If our office receives exchange student application materials by the priority deadline, students will have the opportunity to register on time and alongside the Richmond students.• If the application materials are received after the priority deadline, course choices may be severely limited as Richmond students and other exchange students will have already registered. <p>Exchange students must have all course prerequisites and are encouraged to take no more than 4 units per term. We recommend exchange students take at least one course in a subject regarding the United States (e.g., art, music, theater, political science, history, religion, etc) or at least one course outside of the major. Taking all of your courses in a given department will be overwhelming and highly discouraged. Richmond students tend to</p>
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	enroll in 1-2 courses outside of their major each semester to balance their course load.
Special courses for exchange students	Classes specifically designed for exchange students are available through the Department of Languages, Literatures & Cultures. Incoming exchange students should have very strong writing, listening and speaking skills as the volume of daily work required for most courses is high, these courses will help with that.

Housing	<p>https://housing.richmond.edu/</p> <p>Exchange students who meet all stated deadlines are guaranteed on campus housing.</p> <p>Approximately 92% of undergraduates live on campus. Exchange students are not permitted to live off-campus. Furnished short-term off-campus housing is difficult to find and public transportation is limited.</p> <p>There are two kinds of housing available to undergraduate exchange students:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none">1. Residence Halls2. University Apartments
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	<p>Due to the timing of the exchange applications, students are not able to request a specific type of housing and will be assigned based on roommate compatibility.</p> <p>Law exchange students will be assigned with law school student housing.</p>
<p>Breaks</p>	<p>Exchange students can remain on-campus during breaks but must apply through StarRez (online application system) by the designated deadline for each break period.</p> <p>Summer housing is an additional cost. Meals during break periods are not included in the meal plan and must be paid out of pocket.</p>
<p>Social Programs</p>	<p>Students are encouraged to participate in our Ambassador and Host Family programs, which connect your students with Richmond students and local families in the Richmond area. More information on these programs is available at: https://international.richmond.edu/global-richmond/cultural-exchange/index.html</p>
<p>Visa Information</p>	<p>Exchange students who are non-U.S. citizens or permanent residents are required to apply for a J-1 student visa. F-1 student visas are required for non-U.S. citizens or permanent residents who complete their MBA program at Richmond. The F-1 student visa may also be recommended for certain nationalities.</p> <p>Accepted students will receive an official acceptance letter and admission packet along with the DS-2019 or I-20 if it is necessary to apply for a student visa which should be done at the U.S. consulate closest to their permanent residence.</p>
<p>Work Authorization</p>	<p>On-campus: Exchange students are permitted to work on campus 20 hours per week while school is in session and full time during official school breaks. Most students work no more than 10 hours per week. This is also the smallest meal plan a student can purchase if they are assigned to a dorm room.
