

HOW IT WORKS for Joint Honours students

- Period of study is 1 academic year, not just 1 semester *(unless you are doing Irish)*
- If selected, you are transferred to 3BA4, Third Year of the BA International
- No tuition fees to Host University – but pay normal registration fee to the University of Galway.
- So you remain registered as a University of Galway student while studying abroad.
- The year abroad must be completed successfully
- 40 ECTS credits in total: 20 ECTS in each of your degree subjects
- Pass all modules abroad: receive 60 ECTS from University of Galway, i.e. a Pass in the Year Abroad



BA Joint Honours Students

- Must pass Second Year
- Transfer from 3-year BA to 4-year BA International
- Secure 40 ECTS on Year Abroad
- Return to Galway for Final Year




HOW IT WORKS for other programmes

- BA Government: 1 semester (Semester 2)
- Other, denominated programmes: usually 1 semester
- No tuition fees to Host University – but pay normal registration fee to the University of Galway.
- Remain registered as a University of Galway student while studying abroad.
- The studies abroad must be completed successfully.
- 20 ECTS for one semester of study abroad
- Pass all modules abroad: receive 30 ECTS from University of Galway, i.e. a Pass in the Semester Abroad

There are also some links with the **USA, Canada and Hong Kong**.







Cian, currently on Erasmus in Vilnius (Lithuania)









Rory, on Erasmus at Radboud University, Nijmegen, the Netherlands


Nicola, Soc. & Pol. Erasmus in Helsinki, 2022/23

I couldn't have chosen a better place for Erasmus if I was free to choose anywhere in Europe, honestly”.






Marcia, currently on Erasmus in Lund (Sweden)

I'm definitely enjoying Leuven - classes are very full on, but very interesting and we have lots of European guest lecturers who have great experience! It is very much opening my eyes to a broader European perspective on both Law and Economics. There is also a good few Irish students studying here from Galway, Limerick and Dublin, so that is definitely helping with my transition in Leuven.

- Lively student atmosphere, and Irish culture -
 - There is an Irish pub called Stapletons in the town, where I met most of my friends who are from Ireland
 - Oude Market which is a street of various pubs and restaurants which is always busy and is just outside the law campus
 - Irish GAA team which practices twice a week called the Earls of Leuven.
 - There is always student activities organised either by the University, societies or student accommodations - eg there was a 24 hour run on around Leuven, and all throughout the first week there was various international parties through the ESN
- The university is spread out around Leuven, so most people cycle everywhere, although you can get a bus pass for the year which is 30 euro. Everything is very accessible on foot however.
- The lectures are always very interesting and engaging - however they are 2 hours long, and there is an expectation that you already have prior knowledge on the topic from your undergraduate degree
 - All of the modules are very European focused - a lot of discussion on the EU
 - There is often guest lecturers who have very interesting background and experience in what they are lecturing in - for example we had a guest lecturer from NATO in last week
- There is a train station in Leuven which is 15 minutes trip to the airport, and connects to all the major cities in Belgium, so it is easy to travel around Belgium, and to surrounding countries

I'm loving IU so far. The classes are very interesting and I'm falling in love with some of the modules and finding out that clinical psychology may be the career route for me!





Weekend impressions of Chicago






Dara studied Soc. & Pol. and History at the University of Richmond*


Maggie studied Archaeology at Charles University Prague



Munich is a big, beautiful city full of history but also full of life, there is always events, something to do or somewhere to go.



In late September, Oktoberfest starts, which is a big festival which happens in the city with big beer tents being set up as well as food stalls and funfair rides.

Overall, I'm really enjoying my time here, I love the German culture and living in Munich and also having the opportunity to improve my German.





Paula, did Erasmus in Utrecht, 2024/25

- It depends on what subjects you are studying
- Many exchange agreements (or “links”) are subject-specific
- Go to CASSCS website – click on International, then Outgoing Students, then Opportunities for non-language students
- Consult table of partner unis and subjects
- Pay attention to “**core subject**” requirements!
- BA Joint Hons and BA Govt: Erasmus AND non-EU, *provided your degree subjects are eligible and suitable*
- Denominated Psychology/Creative Writing: certain non-EU links only



What does “core subject” mean?

It means that our exchange with that university is specific to that subject.

To select that university, you must be taking that subject as part of your degree.

e.g. You cannot apply for Prague unless you are studying Archaeology.

You cannot apply for the Malta Classics exchange unless you are studying Classics.

University College Maastricht: Liberal Arts & Sciences

- Unique problem-based learning approach – small tutorial groups, interactive learning, and real-world case studies encourage independence and teamwork.
- a valuable opportunity for students who want to learn useful skills and are prepared to work hard and attend class diligently

- Located at the heart of Europe – easy connections to major cities





University College Maastricht – a great opportunity for students with high grades – **but consistent attendance will be required!!! Here are some of the advantages:**

International & Multicultural Atmosphere - one of the most international universities in the Netherlands: over 60% of students and staff are international, creating a truly global classroom. English is widely spoken, and many programs are taught fully in English.

2. Problem-Based Learning (PBL)

Unlike traditional lecture-based systems, Maastricht University is famous for its **Problem-Based Learning (PBL)** approach. Small tutorial groups, interactive learning, and real-world case studies encourage independence and teamwork. This is very attractive for students who want **active, skills-based learning** rather than passive lectures.

3. Location: Heart of Europe

Maastricht sits right on the border of Belgium and Germany, with Paris, Brussels, Cologne, and Amsterdam just a train ride away. Living in Maastricht means you're in a small city but at the **crossroads of Europe**. Housing is significantly easier to find and also more affordable than elsewhere in the Netherlands.

4. Charming Student City

Maastricht has a **beautiful historic center**, cobblestone streets, old city walls, and a mix of Dutch, Belgian, and French influences. The city is **safe, walkable, and bike-friendly**, with lots of cozy cafés, bars, and cultural events. It's a smaller city compared to Amsterdam, Utrecht, or Rotterdam, meaning **less chaos and more community feel**.

5. High Quality of Life

Green surroundings, the Meuse river, and nearby hills make Maastricht stand out in the otherwise flat Netherlands. Cafés, terraces, art festivals, and a vibrant nightlife make it attractive beyond academics. It's known for its **Burgundian lifestyle**—good food, good wine, and social life.

6. Tight-Knit Community

Because Maastricht is smaller and more international than most Dutch university cities, students often say it feels like a **close, welcoming community** rather than just another big student hub.

7. European Heritage

Maastricht is historically significant as the birthplace of the **European Union (Treaty of Maastricht, 1992)**. For students interested in politics, international law, business, or European studies, that's a huge symbolic selling point.



Study Social Sciences at the University of Göttingen (Germany)

A great opportunity for students taking Soc. & Pol. in combination with Economics, Law or Global Media.

Check out their [fact sheet](#) – it has loads of useful information and links to give insights into student life in beautiful Göttingen, which has always been a very popular destination for students of German. Social Sciences is one of the few areas where they offer extensive teaching through English.

German is not necessary, but would be useful, and language classes are available.

Some terms we use

Home University: University of Galway

Host University: the university where you study abroad

Exchange agreement: a “contract” between universities to exchange students, usually in a particular subject area

Learning agreement: a “contract” between you and your home/host universities, setting out what courses you will take while abroad.

Academic coordinator: the lecturer at the University of Galway who will provide guidance on course choice and sign your learning agreement, and with whom you are expected to keep in touch before and during your year abroad.





How should I choose courses?

- Consult the host university's online course catalogue (links provided).
- Avoid duplicating what you've already studied.
- Avoid significant overlap with your Final Year courses.
- Modules to complement and enhance your study of your degree subjects.
- Modules that you wouldn't ordinarily get the chance to study.
- Modules related to society/culture of host country.
- Check location of teaching (some unis have multiple campuses)
- Avoid self-study modules.
- Need approval from University of Galway academic coordinators.



Will the University of Galway arrange my accommodation abroad?

- No, but ...
- We will offer advice on this topic
- Each host university has a dedicated **Accommodation Service**.
- Possibility of a room in a student residence
- Early application advisable!



Will the marks I get while abroad count towards my degree?

- Period abroad assessed on Pass/Fail basis by University of Galway
- Transcript from host university will show all your results
- Valuable document, e.g. for postgrad applications, seeking employment, etc



What happens if I fail the Year Abroad? Or if I withdraw halfway through?

- No International degree
- Return to enrol on Year 3 of normal BA
- Repeat fees will be payable (currently €2,140 for full year without Government-funded “free tuition”)
- Withdrawal after 60 days but before 30 Jan.: Leave of absence for semester 2, and one semester of fees (currently €2,869) payable in final year. Partial Erasmus grant repayment.
- Withdrawal before 60 days: repay Erasmus grant, and LoA not possible after 31 October



COSTS – What to budget for

- Flights, including flight home at Christmas
- Accommodation
- Household bills
- Food
- Books, materials
- Leisure
- Insurance (for North America)

ESTIMATES – some examples

Uppsala University: ~ €920 per month

University of Tartu: €400 to €600 per month

Boston College: \$28,000 for the academic year (~ €25,640)

Helsinki: ~ €900 - €1250 per month

Leiden, Leuven: €950 to €1300 per month

Malta: €400 - €700 per month





FUNDING

- Erasmus funding for study in Europe:
 - €385 per month for many countries
 - €330 per month for Czechia, Estonia, Hungary, Lithuania, Malta, Poland, Slovakia, Spain
 - 80% of total grant at start, balance on return
 - Plus one-off travel grant, based on distance
 - Supplementary Erasmus funding for financially disadvantaged students
 - Maintain eligibility for SUSI grant, etc
 - “non-adjacent” rate may apply, provided study abroad integral to course
 - (Erasmus Disability grant, if applicable)
- *Erasmus funding cannot be guaranteed!*
- Boston College: \$5,000 scholarship (FY)
- Other non-EU: no funding





Be aware that ...



- *Study abroad is demanding*
- *It will require a whole set of personal qualities to deal with the everyday challenges.*
- *These qualities can be developed, but you must be prepared to step out of your comfort zone.*
- *It's important to do thorough research on academic, practical and financial matters.*
- *Mental health issues? – study abroad may prove stressful, so please consider carefully whether it's appropriate for you.*



Making your application

- Online form will be circulated by e-mail tomorrow.
- Strict deadline: **midnight on Wednesday, 4th February**
- Consult the materials on the web page mentioned earlier, especially the Appendix and list of host universities.
- In your application you must
 - provide First Year and 2nd Year Semester 1 results;
 - choose up to 3 potential host universities and explain your choices;
 - write a statement of motivation.
- Selections will be done in consultation with academic coordinators.
- In some cases, students may be called for brief informal interview.





STUDY ABROAD: A STUDENT VIEW

“For me, Erasmus is more than just University: it’s the people, the culture, the places, the friends that I’ve made, the experience I’ve gained and the memories that I’ll have forever.”

- Explain your choices and write a personal statement.
- Submit your form before the **deadline**.
- Successful candidates will be nominated to a host university in coming months.
