Introduction

The BA (Joint Honours) in Sociological and Political Studies explores how society and politics shape our everyday lives. This engaging degree helps you understand key social and political issues, from inequality and identity to power, policy and global change. You will develop critical thinking and research skills valued across sectors, from public service and journalism to advocacy and international development. You'll also have opportunities for study abroad and learning experiences that prepare you for impactful careers.

What will you study?

This programme introduces basic concepts in political science and sociology, Irish society and politics, political sociology, political and social theory, social science research methods and computer skills, European society and politics, public policy, environmental sociology, and development theories and practice. You are also facilitated in choosing a specialist interest from a range of special topics.

The BA in Sustainability and Social Sciences gives you the tools to understand complex societal issues and drive meaningful change. What will you study?

This interdisciplinary programme offers a dynamic blend of theory and practice across the social sciences. In the early years, you'll build a strong foundation in sociology, political science, geography, economics, and digital skills. As you progress, you'll engage with world issues through research methods, a European fieldtrip, and applied learning.

Year 2

In addition to further developing your critical understanding of key areas of the Social Sciences, you will focus on problem-centred learning. You will undertake research method courses aimed at understanding social scientific research and how it contributes to tackling current societal challenges and learn how to use social scientific technology tools such as GIS. Year 2 also involves a significant European fieldtrip in Semester 2

You will select modules within your preferred career pathway. In addition, you are paired with an experienced academic supervisor to design and develop an independent research project, with a strong focus on publishing your completed work. The four indicative study pathways offered in this final year are:

- Communities, Engagement and Development



Year 3

You will undertake a significant work-based semester-long internship. You may avail of a wide range of existing placement opportunities or seek your own tailored to your preferred career or further educational pathways. You will also undertake the Professional Skills and Pathways module to prepare you for this work internship and your future careers, and several additional modules such as a Government fieldtrip; The Live Arts Event; Policymaking, Lobbying, and Advocacy; and Development & Change.



GY132 Bachelor of Arts Government (Politics, Economics and Law)

Introduction

The BA Government (Politics, Economics and Law) at University of Galway offers you the chance to explore how politics, economics and law shape our world. This dynamic degree equips you with the skills to understand and influence public policy, preparing you for careers in local and national government, business, voluntary and non-governmental organisations, the EU, UN and global development agencies. Engage in real-world experiences through study abroad or work placements and build a foundation for a meaningful career.

What will you study?

In the first year, you will take an equal number of modules in each of the three disciplines (Politics 20 ECTS, Economics 20 ECTS, Law 20 ECTS). From the second year onwards, you will select one of the disciplines to major in, and the other two core subjects will be your minors. You will take 30 ECTS for a major in years 2 and 4, and 15 ECTS for each minor).

The third year of the course will consist of a work placement or study abroad, and/ or complementary study Options. The modules listed are subject to change.
