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Bursar's Report on Consolidated Financial Statements

Introduction

The attached Financial Statements consolidate the financial results of subsidiary and associate companies which it controls, (e.g. student residences and conferencing activities) with the University's core teaching and research activities. The accounting policies set out in the notes on pages 17-23 form part of the financial statements.

The University also publishes annual financial accounts in an agreed 'HEA Harmonised' format. A copy of these accounts is included on pages 80 to 119 and a reconciliation of results between the two is included at page 45.

Overview

The University is pleased once again to report an operating surplus of €3m for the year ended 30th September 2019 (2018: €7.5m). The University continues to effectively manage its affairs and associated risks against a backdrop of limited Government funding. The operational, financial, and strategic risks faced by the University were escalated early in the new year (Spring 2020) with the arrival of the Corona Virus COVID-19 in Europe. Added to the uncertain impact of Britain's exit from the EU, these risks continue to pose major threats to the Irish economy with potential negative financial impacts nationally and correspondingly for the University.

At the time of writing (Summer 2020), the University is confident of dealing with the impacts of the aforementioned risks in the 2019/20 financial year. However, the reality is that we must budget for a significant deficit in 2020/21 and potentially beyond. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the University's strong balance sheet provides the basis for confidence in the continued applicability of the going concern concept to these and to future financial statements.

As demographic projections have shown, the trend is for increasing numbers of second level students progressing to third level education. These trends are reflected in attached accounts as noted below under 'Operating Results'. The general economic outlook turned negative over the Spring and early Summer of 2020 due to COVID-19. The potential for high levels of unemployment, particularly in the leisure and entertainment sectors (where large numbers of students find 'summer work'), is very real. The impacts on fiscal returns and on Government funding to the third level sector are highly likely to be negative.

As the University launches its ambitious strategic plan for the coming five years, it does so with an increased emphasis on non-state income streams. Foremost in this category is that of Post graduate and non-EU student fees as well as high standard 'on-campus' student accommodation and associated summer lettings.

Operating Results

The reported surplus for the year at €3m is attributable in no small part to increased fee income and well controlled costs. Fee income has risen by €6m due to a combination of increased student numbers, increased fees and a change in mix of students, which has also generated additional Government Grant income via the 'RGAM' funding mechanism. Staff costs have increased by €17m during the year due to a mix of increased Contract Research, restoration of pay cuts, annual increments, actuarial impacts for pension and increased staff headcount.

Liquidity

The continuing strong level of liquidity displayed in the Statement of Financial Position reflects the business model in which the University operates with much of its core funding being 'front loaded'. The University also has significant reserves as measured under FRS 102. One cause of concern, across the sector, is the balance due from Government in relation to pensions as can be seen in the increase in pension debtor in 2019 to €7.4m (2018: €2.8m).

Cash & Investments

During the year the University approved an investment strategy and appointed new investment advisors and investment managers. The physical transfer of funds was taking place at the end of the financial year resulting in a higher cash balance than usual. Within two months of the year-end, a total of €50m was under investment in medium and long-term instruments. A further €10m is held in cash under the stewardship of our investment managers.

Significant Capital Developments

September 2018 saw the opening of Goldcrest Village, our new student residence comprising of 429 beds. This resulted in a significant increase in rental income for the University during the year. The income is used to service the European Investment Bank (EIB) loan interest and repayments, the first capital repayment falling due in July 2020. In June 2019, we drew down a further €21m, the second tranche of the EIB loan. This will facilitate the construction an additional 674 student accommodation beds, to be known as Dunlin Village, for which planning permission was granted during the year.

The University secured €15m towards its learning commons, a reimagined library space for the twenty first century. The funding was a result of a competitive bid to the Higher Education Authority's Strategic Initiative Fund (HESIF). Realisation of the project, over the coming years, will require investment of both Philanthropy and University funds.

The University also embarked on a project to replace its twenty-year old student records system and at the end of 2019 we'll conclude an essential investment in the maintenance of our historic and iconic Quadrangle building.

Conclusion

While the range of challenges facing the University are many and varied, its continued success is assured by virtue of its committed teams who deliver day in, day out, on its strategic objectives, high teaching and research standards, and professional services.

1. Scope of Responsibility. On behalf of the University, I acknowledge Údarás na hOllscoile's responsibility for ensuring that an effective system of internal control is maintained and operated. This responsibility takes account of the requirements of the Code of Governance for Irish Universities 2019.

The Governing Authority (Údarás na hOllscoile) is established under the University Act, 1997. The functions of the Governing Authority are set out in section 18 of this Act. The Board is accountable to the Minister for Education and Skills and HEA and is responsible for ensuring good governance and performs this task by setting strategic objectives and targets and taking strategic decisions on all key business issues. The regular dayto-day management, control and direction of the University are the responsibility of the Chief Officer (the President) and the University Management Team (UMT). The Chief Officer and UMT must follow the broad strategic direction set by the Governing Authority and must ensure that all Governing Authority members have a clear understanding of the key activities and decisions related to the University, and of any significant risks likely to arise. The Chief Officer acts as a direct liaison between the Governing Authority and management of

The Governing Authority of NUI Galway is responsible for, and is satisfied that, the University is substantially compliant with all statutory obligations applicable to the University that may be set out in legislation governing the establishment and role of the University and other relevant legislation.

A revised Code of Governance for Irish Universities was issued in September 2019 and is effective from January 2019. Údarás na hOllscoile has adopted the Code of Governance for Irish Universities (2019) and has put procedures in place to ensure compliance with the Code.

2. Governing Authority Meetings

There were six meetings of Údarás na hOllscoile during the 2018/19 financial year. A list of the members forms part of the record of member attendance set out on pages 47 to 48.

3. Fees and Expenses

No fees are paid to members of Údarás na hOllscoile. The aggregate expenses paid to external members of Údarás na hOllscoile is €21,761. The expenses paid to members of Údarás na hOllscoile are in accordance with the guidelines from the Department of Finance.

4. Purpose of the System of Internal Control. The System of Internal Control is designed to manage risk to a tolerable level rather than to eliminate it. The system can therefore only provide reasonable and not absolute assurances that assets are safeguarded, transactions authorised and properly recorded and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or detected in a timely way.

The system of internal control, which accords with guidance issued by the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform has been in place in the University for the year ended 30 September 2019 and up to date of approval of the financial statements

- 5. Key control procedures. Údarás na hOllscoile has established a strong and robust control environment in the University through:
- Holding regular Údarás meetings where the agenda includes strategic issues such as governance, financial management and University strategy
- The implementation of the University Strategic Plan 2015 2020 (Vision 2020), and the development of its successor covering 2020 2025.
- Clearly defined management responsibilities, authority and accountability, delegation of appropriate functions and reviewing and approving all key policies
- Approval of annual budgets, cash flow forecasting and capital programme expenditure with formal review of these at each Governing Authority meeting
- The work of the Audit Committee, which met four times in the financial year to 30th September 2019
- Five internal audits were conducted in 2018/19, with regular meetings between the Audit Committee and the Internal Audit department to discuss their work programme, the outcomes of their audits and their recommendations
- The operation of a risk management system with regular review of the risk policy
- Risk Management Group comprising of all members of the University Management team (UMT) and external members is accountable for risk management at a strategic level. The Risk Advisory Group, which is made up of managers of the professional support units and colleges and chaired by a member of the UMT report to the Risk Management Group. In terms of the overall governance structure, the Risk Management Group is a subcommittee of Finance/Resource Committee,
- Ongoing review of the Academic and Professional Support Units which are reviewed at the quarterly Risk Management Group Meetings
- Strategic risk register in place which records the strategic risks of the University. These are reviewed on an ongoing basis and reviewed at the Risk Management Group
- Robust systems of health and safety, with regular reports to the UMT and Udarás
- Monitoring of compliance with legislation including University Act 1997 and GDPR
- Internal Control Questionnaires are issued to each Head of School and Unit in the University on an annual basis and reviewed by the Internal Audit and Risk Management department
- Internal Financial Control Templates are reviewed by the control owners on an annual basis and reviewed by the Internal Audit and Risk Management department

Review of Statement of Internal Control

The Statement of Internal Control was reviewed by the Audit Committee on the 5th December 2019.

Financial and Budgetary Management Systems

There is a comprehensive annual budgeting system with annual income, budget allocation process, cash flow forecasting and capital programme budgeting reviewed and approved by Governing Authority at the start of each year, with formal review at each subsequent Finance/Resource Committee meeting. Policies and procedures are in place in relation to budgetary and financial matters, with delegated authority levels in place for the approval of purchase orders. There are regular reviews by Údarás na hOllscoile's, UMT and the relevant standing committees and a Procurement Plan is in place.

Procedures for monitoring the effectiveness of the Internal Control System

The following audits per the agreed Internal Audit plan for 2018 and 2019 were completed:

- Review of the Research Accounts office
- Review of Equality and Diversity
- GDPR Review
- Review of Risk Management Arrangements
- Review of Procurement.

Implementation plans to address internal audit recommendations are approved by the Audit Committee. Progress on the implementation of the actions in each of the Internal Audit Implementation Plans is reviewed annually and reported to the Audit Committee and the Finance/Resource Committee.

The Internal Audit Plan for 2018 and 2019 reflected the risks identified in the various University Risk Registers, the management letter of the Comptroller and Auditor General, guidance from the HEA and general developments and issues in relation to Governance. The Internal Audit Plan for 2019 was approved by the Audit Committee in December 2018 with a draft plan for 2020 to be presented at the December 2019 meeting.

Capacity to Handle Risk

The University has an Audit Committee (ARC) comprising members of the Governing Authority as well as external members with a broad range of experience including financial and audit expertise, one of whom is the Chair.

The University has an internal audit function which is adequately resourced and conducts a programme of work agreed with the Audit Committee. The function is supported by an outsourced internal audit provider. The Director of Internal Audit and Risk Management is responsible for risk.

The Risk Management Group and Risk Advisory Group oversees the risk management policy which sets out the University's risk appetite, the risk management processes in place and details the roles and responsibilities of staff in relation to risk. The policy has been issued to all staff who are expected to work within the University's risk management policies, to alert management on emerging risks and control weaknesses and assume responsibility for risks and controls within their own area of work.

The financial implications of strategic and operational risks have been considered through the formal business risk assessment process and in the preparation of the Internal Audit Plans. A comprehensive set of Financial Procedures have been put in place to control the significant financial elements of the University's business including authorisation limits for purchasing/expenditure.

Risk and Control Framework

The University has implemented a risk management system which identifies and reports key risks and the management actions being taken to address and, to the extent possible, to mitigate those risks.

The University's Risk Management Policy is in compliance with the Code of Governance for Irish Universities 2019. A risk register is in place for both Schools and Professional Support Units. A strategic risk register is also in place. These risk registers identify the key risks facing the University and these have been identified, evaluated and ranked according to their significance. The register is reviewed and updated on a regular basis (formally annually) and presented to the Risk Management Group. The outcome of these assessments is used to plan and allocate resources to ensure risks are managed to an acceptable level.

The risk registers detail the controls and actions needed to mitigate risks and responsibility for operation of controls assigned to specific staff. I confirm that a control environment containing the following elements is in place:

- Procedures for all key strategic and operational processes have been documented
- Financial responsibilities have been assigned at management level with corresponding accountability
- There is an appropriate budgeting system with an annual budget which is kept under review by senior management
- There are systems aimed at ensuring the security of the information and communication technology systems
- There are systems in place to safeguard the assets, and
- Control procedures over grant funding to outside agencies ensure adequate control over approval of grants and monitoring and review of grantees to ensure grant funding has been applied for the purpose intended.

Ongoing Monitoring and Review

Formal procedures have been established for monitoring control processes and control deficiencies are communicated to those responsible for taking corrective action and to management and the Governing Authority, where relevant, in a timely way. I confirm that the following ongoing monitoring systems are in place:

- Key risks and related controls have been identified and processes have been put in place to monitor the operation of those key controls and report any identified deficiencies
- Reporting arrangements have been established at all levels where responsibility for financial management has been assigned, and
- There are regular reviews by senior management of periodic and annual performance and financial reports which indicate performance against budgets/forecasts

Procurement

I confirm that the University has procedures in place to ensure substantial compliance with current procurement rules and guidelines. While a review of compliance levels in 2018/19 shows scope for improvement, the University is substantially compliant and continues to invest in its systems and processes so as to eliminate non-compliance in the short term.

Procurement (con'd)

I confirm the University is using the services and frameworks of the Office of Government Procurement and of the Education Procurement Services, where applicable. During the year ended 30 September 2019, tenderable expenditure amounted to approximately €98 million. Of this, €2.9 million (<3.1% of total expenditure), relating to 63 suppliers, did not comply with the current procurement legislation in relation to public procurement tendering requirements. Non-competitive procurement expenditure of €2.78m was identified by the University during the year. In addition €0.2m of non-competitive procurement expenditure was identified during the audit. The University continues to work towards full compliance with all relevant guidelines.

Review of Effectiveness

I confirm that the University has procedures in place to monitor the effectiveness of its risk management and control procedures, including review of the performance of the Governing Authority and its sub-committee. The University's monitoring and review of the effectiveness of the system on internal financial control is informed by the work of the internal and external auditors, the Audit Committee which oversees their work, and the University's UMT responsible for the development and maintenance of the internal control framework.

Annual Review of the Effectiveness on Internal Control

The University engaged the IPA to carry out a review of its Governing Authority's operation and structures in Spring 2019. This review led to the establishment of a working group charged with implementing the agreed recommendations from the IPA's review.

The annual review of the effectiveness on internal controls for 2018/19 was conducted in November 2019 and was approved by the Audit Committee on 5th December 2019, presented to Finance/Resource Committee on 5th December 2019 and presented to Údarás na hOllscoile 12th December 2019. In undertaking this review, the following was considered:

- Risk management policies, systems and procedures
- Internal audits conducted in the period. All audits provided substantial assurance and all recommendations are being implemented
- External audit by KPMG and the Comptroller and Auditor General
- The work of the Audit Committee and Finance/Resource Committee
- Internal Control Questionnaire
- Internal Financial Control Template
- Annual Chair Assurances received from each of the five standing committees
- Annual reports completed by Health & Safety Department, Quality Assurance, ISS and Procurement.
- Annual report completed by Internal audit and Risk Management.

Internal Control Issues

There were no material losses, frauds or breaches in control in 2018/19. No weaknesses in internal control were identified in relation to 2018/19 that require disclosure in the financial statements.

Consultancy costs/fees

Consultancy costs are included under the heading 'Consultancy, Professional, Audit and Legal' as set out under Note 9 'Other Operating Expenses' on page 29 of the Financial Statements. The analysis below includes the cost of external advice to management and excludes audit fees.

The University is working to put measures in place to ensure that these disclosures will be achieved in the Annual Report for the year ended 30 September 2020.

Value for Money

NUI Galway has to the best of its knowledge and belief followed the guidelines in achieving value for money in public expenditure as set out in the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform Public Spending Code.

Termination/ Severance payments and agreements

No severance payments have been made without a prior written request for approval from the Department of Education and Skills. The total cost incurred by the University for termination/ severance payments and agreements is set out under Note 8c on page 28 of the Financial Statements.

Travel and Subsistence

The total cost incurred by the University for travel and subsistence is set out under Note 9 'Other Operating Expenses' on page 29 of the Financial Statements.

Hospitality and Catering

The total cost incurred by the University for hospitality and entertainment expenses is included under Note 9 'Other Operating Expenses' on page 29 of the Financial Statements.

Opinion on the financial statements

I have audited the financial statements of Ollscoil na hÉireann, Gaillimh for the year ended 30 September 2019 as required under the provisions of the Universities Act 1997. The financial statements comprise

- the consolidated and University statement of comprehensive income and retained reserves
- the consolidated and University statement of financial position
- · the consolidated statement of cash flows and
- the related notes, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the assets, liabilities and financial position of the University and of the University group at 30 September 2019 and of the income and expenditure of the University and the University group for the year then ended in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard (FRS) 102 — The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland.

Emphasis of matter — deferred pension funding asset

Without qualifying my opinion on the financial statements, I draw attention to Note 24 Retirement Benefits and to the recognition as at 30 September 2019 of an asset of €1,220 million in respect of deferred pension funding.

The recognition of a deferred pension funding asset in respect of the Joint Pension Scheme (€735 million) and the Single Public Service Pension Scheme (€23 million) reflects statutory provisions relating to the funding of those schemes.

The recognition of an asset of €462 million in respect of the Model Pension Scheme and pension supplementation anticipates that funding will be provided by the State to meet pension liabilities as they fall due. Inherent in this accounting treatment is an assumption that any income generated by the University will in the first instance be applied towards current expenses and that State funding will meet any shortfall in resources required to meet future pension liabilities.

Basis of opinion

I conducted my audit of the financial statements in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as promulgated by the International Organisation of Supreme Audit Institutions. My responsibilities under those standards are described in the appendix to this report. I am independent of the University and have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the standards.

In conducting my audit, I seek to rely on evidence from an audit of the financial statements by independent auditors engaged by the University

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Report of the C&AG (continued)

Report on information other than the financial statements, and on other matters

The University has presented certain other information together with the financial statements. This comprises the Bursar's report, the statement on the system of governance and internal control, a statement of responsibilities of Údarás na hOllscoile, a reconciliation between the financial statements and a university funding statement for 2018/2019 prepared for the Higher Education Authority, a statement of corporate social responsibility, an attendance list for Údarás na hOllscoile meetings in 2018/19, audited consolidated financial statements for Galway University Foundation Company Limited by Guarantee for the year ended 30 June 2019 and financial statements of the University for the year ended 30 September 2019 prepared for the Higher Education Authority.

My responsibilities to report in relation to such information, and on certain other matters upon which I report by exception, are described in the appendix to this report.

Procurement non-compliance

Responsibilities of members of Údarás na hOllscoile

The members are responsible for

- the preparation of financial statements in the form prescribed under the Universities Act 1997
- ensuring that the financial statements give a true and fair view in accordance with FRS102
- · ensuring the regularity of transactions
- assessing whether the use of the going concern basis of accounting is appropriate, and
- such internal control as they determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Responsibilities of the Comptroller and Auditor General

I am required under the Universities Act 1997 to audit the financial statements of the University and to report thereon to the Houses of the Oireachtas.

My objective in carrying out the audit is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement due to fraud or error. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with the ISAs, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. In doing so,

- I identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements whether due to fraud or error; design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks; and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- I obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the internal controls.
- I evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures.
- I conclude on the appropriateness of the use of the going concern basis of accounting and, based on the audit evidence obtained, on whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the University's ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty

exists, I am required to draw attention in my report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my report. However, future events or conditions may cause the University to cease to continue as a going concern.

 I evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

I communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.

Information other than the financial statements

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information presented with those statements, and I do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, I am required under the ISAs to read the other information presented and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or with knowledge obtained during the audit, or if it otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact.

Reporting on other matters

My audit is conducted by reference to the special considerations which attach to bodies in receipt of substantial funding from the State in relation to their management and operation. I report if I identify material matters relating to the manner in which public business has been conducted

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the year ended 30 September 2019

1. Accounting Policies

The basis of significant accounting policies adopted by Ollscoil na hÉireann, Gaillimh are set out below. Except for the change in recognition for certain research donations which were previously taken to the Statement of Comprehensive Income, these policies have all been applied consistently throughout the year and for the preceding year. The impact of this change in accounting policy is a credit of €0.7m to the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

a. General Information

Ollscoil na hÉireann, Gaillimh commenced activities in 1849 as Queen's College, Galway. The Irish Universities Act (1908) made this college a constituent college of the new National University of Ireland, and under a new charter the name of the university changed to University College, Galway. It was given special statutory responsibility under the University College, Galway Act (1929) in respect of the use of the Irish language as the working language of the college. It retained the title of University College, Galway until the Universities Act (1997) changed it to the National University of Ireland, Galway (Ollscoil na hÉireann, Gaillimh). Its principal place of business is University Road, Galway.

b. Ollscoil na hÉireann, Gaillimh is a Public Benefit Entity (PBE)

c. Statement of Compliance

The financial statements of Ollscoil na hÉireann, Gaillimh for the year ended 30 September 2019 have been prepared in accordance with FRS 102, the financial reporting standard applicable in the UK and Ireland issued by the Financial Reporting Council and the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting for Further and Higher Education 2015, which has been voluntarily adopted by the university.

d. Basis of Preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The presentation currency of these financial statements is the euro (€). All amounts have been rounded to the nearest thousand (€000s).

e. Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the financial statements of the University and its subsidiary undertakings made up to 30 September 2019. A subsidiary is an entity that is controlled by the holding undertaking. The results of subsidiary undertakings are included in the consolidated Statement of Comprehensive Income from the date that control commences until the date that control ceases.

Control is established when the University has the power to govern the operating and financial policies of an entity so as to obtain benefits from its activities. In assessing control, the group takes into consideration potential voting rights that are currently exercisable.

An associate is an entity in which the group has significant influence, but not control, over the operating and financial policies of the entity. Significance influence is presumed to exists when the investors holds between 20% and 50% of the equity voting rights.

Investments in associates are shown in the University's own Statement of Financial Position at cost less provisions for impairments in value.

In accordance with FRS102, the activities of the Students Union have not been consolidated because the University does not exert control or dominant influence over its activities or policy decisions. The financial statements of Galway University Foundation Limited are also excluded from consolidation on the same basis.

f. Recognition of income

Government sourced recurrent/revenue grants (including research grants) are recognised in income over the periods in which the university recognises the related costs for which the grant is intended to compensate. Where part of a government grant is deferred, it is recognised as deferred income within creditors and allocated between creditors due within one year and due after more than one year, as appropriate.

Non-government sourced recurrent/revenue grants (including research grants) are recognised in income when the university is entitled to the income and performance-related conditions (if any) have been met. Income received in advance of performance-related conditions being met is recognised as deferred income within creditors on the Statement of Financial Position and released to income as the conditions are met.

Government sourced non-recurrent/non-revenue grants received (or, in the case of certain capital grants, receivable) from the Higher Education Authority or other government bodies in respect of the acquisition or construction of fixed assets are treated as deferred capital grants and amortised in line with depreciation over the life of the related assets.

Non-government sourced non-recurrent/non-revenue grants are accounted for as Donations & Endowments as set out in g below.

Fee income is credited to the Consolidated Statement of Comprehensive Income over the period in which the students are studying. Bursaries and scholarships are accounted for as gross expenditure and not deducted from income.

Rental income is credited to the Statement of Comprehensive Income once related services are deemed to have been delivered to customers when the entity has met its obligations under contract. Services invoiced and paid in advance are deferred and are included in creditors in the Statement of Financial Position.

Investment income is credited to the Statement of Comprehensive Income on a receivable basis.

Funds that the university receives and disburses as paying agent on behalf of a funding body are excluded from the income and expenditure of the university where the university is exposed to minimal risk or enjoys minimal economic benefit related to the transaction.

Other recurrent income from the sale of services is credited to the Statement of Comprehensive Income when the services are supplied to external customers or the terms of the contract have been satisfied.

g. Donations and Endowments

All donations and endowments represent non-exchange transactions. Non-exchange transactions include grants from private and charitable individuals or organisations including research grants.

Non-exchange transaction income is recognised as follows;

- (i) Transactions that do not impose specified future performance-related conditions on the University are recognised in income when the resources are received or receivable.
- (ii) Transactions that impose specified future performance-related conditions on the University are recognised in income only when the performance-related conditions are met.

A performance-related condition is defined as one that requires the performance of a particular level of service of units or output to be delivered, with payment of, or entitlement to, the resources conditional on that performance.

h. Interest receivable and interest payable

Interest receivable and similar income include interest receivable on funds invested.

Interest payable and similar expenses include interest payable and net foreign exchange gains or losses that are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income. Borrowing costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition, construction or production of an asset that takes a substantial time to be prepared for use, are capitalised as part of the cost of that asset.

Interest income is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income as it accrues, using the effective interest rate method. Foreign currency gains and losses are reported on a net basis (see point i hereunder).

i. Foreign currency translation

Transactions denominated in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate of exchange ruling at the dates of the transactions. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into euro at year end rates. The resulting exchange differences are dealt with in the determination of income and expenditure for the financial year.

j. Property, plant & equipment

Land and buildings

Freehold land is not depreciated. Freehold buildings are depreciated over their expected useful economic life to the University – normally fifty years. Leasehold buildings are included in the Statement of Financial Position at cost and depreciated over the term of the lease.

Where land and buildings are acquired with the aid of specific grants they are capitalised and depreciated as above. Any related government grants are recognised as deferred income within creditors and are released to the Statement of Comprehensive Income over the expected useful economic life of the related asset on a basis consistent with the depreciation policy.

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of the fixed asset may not be recoverable.

Buildings under construction are accounted for at cost, based on the value of architects' certificates and other direct costs incurred to the financial year end. They are not depreciated until they are brought into use.

Equipment

Equipment costing less than €10,000 per individual item is written off to the Statement of Comprehensive Income in the year of acquisition. All other equipment is capitalised at cost. Capitalised equipment is depreciated over its useful economic life as follows:

Computer equipment 3 years
Other equipment 5 years

Where equipment is acquired with the aid of specific government grants, it is capitalised and depreciated in accordance with the above policy, with any related grant being recognised as deferred income within creditors and released to the Statement of Comprehensive Income over the expected useful economic life of the related equipment.

k. Heritage assets

The University has acquired a number of assets of unqualified historical and cultural importance to the State. These assets include archives relating to literature and other arts, such as drama, as well as period houses, artworks and other paintings and artefacts.

Period houses, such as the Quadrangle, are part of the working infrastructure of the University Campus and, as such, are capitalised in the Statement of Financial Position at original cost. These are depreciated over fifty years.

Archives purchased for the benefit of the University's academic mission are also capitalised in the Statement of Financial Position at original cost and not depreciated.

Given the historical and cultural importance of these assets, it is University policy to have procedures around their acquisition, preservation, management and disposal (using the various committees and accounting system) to separately identify and manage these important assets.

Operating leases

Payments (excluding costs for services and insurance) made under operating leases are recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income on a straight-line basis over the term of the lease.

m. Financial assets

Investments in subsidiaries are carried at cost less impairment.

Quoted investments are stated at market value based on prices ruling at the Statement of Financial Position date. Unit trusts are stated at net asset value quoted by the investment managers at the year-end date. Investments which are held in managed funds and unit linked funds are stated at bid prices at the Statement of Financial Position date.

n. Inventory

Inventory consists mainly of stationery, fuel and laboratory/cleaning consumables, and is recognised in the financial statements at the lower of Cost and Net Realisable Value (NRV). Cost is calculated on a first-in-first-out (FIFO) basis and includes all purchase costs. NRV is the selling price (actual or estimated) less all necessary completion costs.

o. Trade and other debtors/creditors

Trade and other debtors/creditors are recognised initially at transaction price. Subsequent to initial recognition, they are measured at amortised cost (using the effective interest rate method) less any impairment losses in the case of trade debtors.

p. Interest-bearing borrowings classified as basic financial instruments

Interest-bearing borrowings are recognised initially at fair value less attributable transaction costs. Subsequent to initial recognition, interest-bearing borrowings are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

q. Taxation

As an exempt charity, the University is not liable for Corporation Tax or Income Tax on any of its charitable activities. It is registered for Value Added Tax, but since the supply of education is an exempt activity on which no output tax is charged it is unable to recover input tax on the majority of its purchases.

Irrecoverable VAT on inputs is included in the costs of such inputs, both revenue and capital. The University does carry out some commercial activity – most notably in the research area. VAT is charged on income from this activity where appropriate. Trading activities undertaken by the University are administered through its subsidiary companies, which as commercial organisations are liable to Corporation Tax.

r. Deferred taxation

In subsidiary companies, which do not hold a charitable status, deferred taxation is provided on all timing differences that have originated but not reversed at the Statement of Financial Position reporting date where transactions or events that result in an obligation to pay more tax in the future or a right to pay less tax in the future have occurred at the reporting date.

Timing differences are temporary differences between profits as computed for taxation purposes and profits as stated in the financial statements that arise because certain items of income and expenditure in the financial statements are dealt with in different periods for the purposes of taxation.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply in the years in which the timing differences are expected to be reversed, based on tax rates and laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date. Deferred tax is not discounted.

A net deferred tax asset is regarded as recoverable and, therefore, recognised only when, on the basis of all available evidence, it can be regarded as more likely than not that there will be suitable taxable profits from which the future reversal of the underlying timing differences can be deducted.

s. Employee Benefits

Short-term Benefits

Short term benefits such as wages and holiday pay are recognised as an expense in the year in which the employee renders service. Any unused benefits are accrued at year-end and included in the Creditors figure in the Statement of Financial Position.

Retirement Benefits

The University operates the following defined-benefit pension schemes:

- Joint Pension Scheme (JPS) this is a 'Pay As You Go' (PAYG) scheme providing pension benefits at retirement on a defined benefit basis, covering entrants up to 31 December 2004.
- Model Pension Schemes (MPS) this is a 'Pay As You Go' (PAYG) scheme providing pension benefits at retirement on a defined benefit basis, covering entrants from 1 January 2005.
- The Single Public Service Pension Scheme ("Single Scheme"), this multi-employer scheme commenced, with
 effect from 1 January 2013. From the commencement date onward new public servants will be members of the
 Single Scheme, which will provide CPI-linked defined-benefit pensions based on career-average pay.

Defined Benefit Pension Schemes

In relation to the above schemes, the actuarially-assessed present value of the various schemes' liabilities (calculated using the projected unit credit method) is disclosed as a liability in the Statement of Financial Position.

Current service costs: These are the costs of additional benefits that scheme members accrue during the year, based on projected pensionable salaries at retirement or earlier cessation of employment. The expense for the year is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Interest cost: This is interest on the defined benefit obligation, which is the total present value of the members' attributed benefits for valuation purposes at the year-end. The expense for the year is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Actuarial gains or losses: These relate to changes in the liabilities due to changes in assumptions or because actual experience during the year was different to that assumed.

The University considers that its pension liabilities are guaranteed by the State. As a consequence, a pension receivable asset, corresponding to the net actuarially-computed liability for pensions, is recognised on the Statement of Financial Position.

Movements on this pension receivable are included in the Statement of Comprehensive Income in order to mirror the underlying movement on the pension liability.

s. Employee Benefits (continued) / Defined Benefit Pension Schemes (continued)

This asset is recognised on foot of:

- a) guarantees enshrined in the Financial Measures (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 2009 in respect of JPS pension benefits at retirement;
- b) the "PAYG" basis of the MPS. Údarás na hOllscoile is of the opinion that the discussions between the sector, the HEA and Government Departments represented assurances that the State will fund any cash-flow deficiencies arising from pension payment obligations; and
- c) guarantees enshrined in the Public Service Pensions (Single Scheme and Other Provisions) Act 2012.

Personal Retirement Savings Accounts (PRSA) pension facility

A PRSA pension facility is also available for staff not eligible for enrolment in the defined-benefits schemes. It is administered by a third party insurance company.

t. Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash in hand, deposits repayable on demand and overdrafts.

Cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash with insignificant risk of change in value. A deposit qualifies as a cash equivalent when it has maturity of 3 months or less from the date of acquisition. Other deposits with longer maturities are classified as financial assets.

u. Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported for assets and liabilities as at the reporting date and the amounts reported for income and expenses during the year. However, the nature of estimation means that actual outcomes could differ from those estimates. The following judgements have had the most significant effect on amounts recognised in the financial statements.

Non-Traded Financial Assets

The value of financial assets that are not traded in active markets is determined by using valuation techniques. The University exercises judgment in selecting a variety of methods and makes assumptions that are mainly based on observable data and conditions existing at each reporting date.

Impairment of Property, Plant and Equipment

Assets that are subject to amortisation are reviewed for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount may not be recoverable. An impairment loss is recognised for the amount by which the asset's carrying amount exceeds its recoverable amount. The recoverable amount is the higher of an asset's fair value less cost to sell and value in use. For the purpose of assessing impairment, assets are grouped at the lowest levels for which there are separately identifiable cash flows (cash generating units). Non-financial assets that suffered impairment are reviewed for possible reversal of the impairment at each reporting date.

Depreciation and Residual Values

The University has reviewed the asset lives and associated residual values of all fixed asset classes and have concluded that asset lives and residual values are appropriate.

Retirement Benefit Obligation and related asset

The assumptions underlying the actuarial valuations for which the amounts recognised in the financial statements are determined (including discount rates, rates of increase in future compensation levels, mortality rates and healthcare cost trend rates) and updated annually based on current economic conditions, and for any relevant changes to the terms and conditions of the pension and post-retirement plans.

u. Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty (continued)

The assumptions can be affected by:

- (i) the discount rate, changes in the rate of return on high-quality corporate bonds
- (ii) future compensation levels, future labour market conditions
- (iii) health care cost trend rates, the rate of medical cost inflation in the relevant regions.

Although the legislation relates specifically to the Joint Pension Scheme and The Single Public Service Pension Scheme, the University believes that the discussions between the University sector, HEA and Government Departments represent assurances that the State will meet all future pension liabilities of defined benefit schemes (i.e. JPS and MPS, including supplementation, in the University's case) on a "Pay As You Go" basis for all categories of staff.

Accordingly, the University has recognised a matching pension receivable in the Statement of Financial Position at an amount equivalent to the full pension liability for these defined benefit schemes for each reported period.

Recoverability of Debtors

The provision for bad debt is calculated based on management's expectation on the recoverability of debt. In calculating the provision for bad debt the following factors are considered: age of the debt, the default history and current situation of the debtor and current market conditions.

Employee Benefits

The accrual for holidays earned but not taken is based on estimates of total holiday leave less leave taken.

v. Reserves

Reserves are classified as restricted or unrestricted. Restricted reserves include balances through which the donor or funder has designated a specific purpose and therefore the University is restricted in the use of these funds.

The European Investment Bank (EIB) has provided part of the funding necessary for the University's capital expenditure programme. This funding will allow the University to complete a comprehensive programme of capital investment including much needed academic and student facilities. This loan facilitates three significant projects:

- (i) the Human Biology Building which provides for medical education,
- (ii) the Centre for Drama, Theatre and Performance which facilitates further study of Irish Theatre and
- (iii) New Student Residences which will provide over 900 additional bed spaces

The split between due between two and five years and after more than five years has been restated for 2018 due to a change to the calculation method.

The facility is repayable over a maximum of 25 years (i.e. to 2042) and currently incurs interest at Euribor plus a margin. The undrawn element of the EIB facility is £nil at 30 September 2019 (2018: £21m).

For a breakdown of the remuneration and benefits paid to key management personnel, please refer to Note 8(b). Key management personnel in the University consist of the President and members of the University Management Team.

The University has availed of the exemption available under "Section 33 Related Party Disclosures" of Financial Reporting Standard 102 and the SORP from disclosing transactions entered into with wholly owned group undertakings.

Bimini Limited is an associate company of the University (as UCG Research Applications Limited has a 28% holding). The company holds a patent. It accounts for the income and related expenses of this patent through the company. The University as at 30 September 2019 was owed Enil by the company (2018: Enil).

The University also holds a minority shareholding in other entities; these are summarised in note 13.

St Angela's College Sligo Limited is a company limited by guarantee with linkages to the University in terms of collaboration and degree accreditation. In accordance with Government policy, the University plans to fully incorporate the activities of the College upon clearance of related legal matters. Both parties have agreed in principle on the legal agreement model for the incorporation and the HEA has sanctioned the employment of a director to oversee the incorporation.

In accordance with FRS102, the financial results of the Students Union, Galway University Foundation Limited, and St Angela's College Ltd. have not been consolidated because the University does not exert control or dominant influence over the policy decisions or activities of these entities.

24. Retirement benefits

The University operates the following defined-benefit pension schemes, which are included within the pension liability in the Statement of Financial Position:

- > Joint Pension Scheme (JPS) this is a 'Pay As You Go' (PAYG) scheme providing pension benefits at retirement on a defined benefit basis, covering entrants to 31 December 2004.
- Model Pension Schemes (MPS) this is a 'Pay As You Go' (PAYG) scheme providing pension benefits at retirement on a defined benefit basis, covering entrants from 1 January 2005.
- The Single Public Service Pension Scheme ("Single Scheme"), this scheme commenced, with effect from 1 January 2013. From the commencement date onward new public servants will be members of the Single Scheme, which will provide CPI-linked defined-benefit pensions based on career-average pay. It is the responsibility of all relevant authorities (employer) to collect and remit Single Scheme member contributions for the benefit of the Exchequer.

Joint and Model Pension Schemes

The Financial Measures (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 2009 came into force on 26 June 2009. It makes legal provision for (a) the State to underwrite the net pension liabilities of the JPS and (b) the transfer of the scheme's assets to the State (National Pension Reserve Fund).

On foot of this legislation, the University has recognised a pension receivable from the State of €967m (2018: €857m) in respect of the Joint Pension Scheme, including supplementation.

Although the legislation relates specifically to the JPS the University believes that the discussions between the University sector, HEA and Government Departments represent assurances that the State will meet all future pension liabilities of defined benefit schemes (i.e. JPS and MPS, including supplementation, in Ollscoil na hÉireann, Gaillimh's case) on a "Pay As You Go" basis for all categories of staff.

Accordingly, the University has also recognised a matching pension receivable in the Statement of Financial Position at an amount equivalent to the full pension liability for the MPS for each reported period. The associated receivable from the State is ϵ 230m (2018: ϵ 180m).

The Single Public Service Pension Scheme ("Single Scheme")

The Single Public Service Pension Scheme ("Single Scheme"), as provided for in the Public Service Pensions (Single Scheme and Other Provisions) Act 2012 commenced, with effect from 1 January 2013. From the commencement date onward new public servants will be members of the Single Scheme, which will provide CPI-linked defined-benefit pensions based on career-average pay. The Scheme's minimum pension age will be linked to the State Pension age (66 years initially, rising to 67 in 2021 and 68 in 2028). Retirement for most members will be compulsory on reaching age 70. The Single Scheme is a multi-employer defined benefit scheme (i.e. one scheme for all "relevant authorities" within the public sector).

It is the responsibility of the employer to collect and remit Single Scheme member contributions for the benefit of the Exchequer. The Single Scheme is included within the University pension liability and, as provided for by the Act, within the associated receivable from the State. The associated receivable from the State is $\epsilon 23m$ (2018: $\epsilon 13m$).

The following disclosures comply with those required under FRS102, which stipulates the methodology for deriving assumptions to be used in calculating the University's pension liabilities and requires disclosure of the University's full pension liability including the liability for post-retirement pension increases payable to pensioners.

The amounts included in these financial statements in relation to pension liabilities are taken from an actuarial valuation report of the pension liabilities prepared by an independent actuary. This report is based on actuarial data as at 30 September 2019. While this report is not publicly available, the more salient points are reproduced in this note.

Contributions (both employer and employee) to pension schemes for the year ended 30 September 2020 are estimated to be €14m.

A PRSA pension facility is also available for staff not eligible for enrolment in the defined-benefits schemes. It is administered by a third party insurance company. There are no employees contributing to this scheme currently.

25. Contingent liabilities

On 22nd October 2018, the University issued a Standby Letter of Credit for USD \$225,511 in favour of Wells Fargo Bank related to a US Department of Education Federal Aid programme for US student borrowers. In the opinion of management, this credit line will never be executed.

The University is involved in a number of legal actions arising in the ordinary course of business. No material adverse impact in the financial position of the University is expected to arise from the ultimate resolution of these actions.

The Financial Measures (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 2009, S.11 provided that discretion in the matter of pension-fund member's rights or benefits pass from the University's Governing Authority to the relevant Minister(s). Prior to this Act, custom and practice was for the University's Governing Authority to award 'added year' pension benefits to qualifying staff. Legally, the discretion to award added years now rests with the Ministers and they have not given their approval. Impacted pension fund members have sought redress from the University, which continues to negotiate with the DES in the matter.

While the potential exposure arising from this can be measured reliably, the liability is 'contingent' on Ministerial approval for payment of the disputed added years. The estimated liability of €12m is therefore disclosed as a contingent liability.

26. Restatement of prior-year figures

Where figures are presented in a different format in the current year, prior-year amounts are restated to ensure consistency and comparability, year-on-year.

27. Subsequent events after year end

The University is closely monitoring the impact of the coronavirus/COVID-19 outbreak that struck Europe in early 2020 resulting in Government restrictions on travel and workplace attendance from 12 March 2020. The University has adapted well to remote working in all aspects of its operations and it continues to develop mitigation plans to deal with the financial impact of the evolving crisis.

While the negative financial impacts in the current year 2019/2020 are forecast to be manageable, the impact on 2020/2021 and subsequent years is likely to prove far more challenging. Much depends on the extent of 'social distancing' required to keep the virus in check as the world awaits development of a vaccine.

At the time of writing, the Governing Authority sees no threat to the financial viability of the University and believes the application of the going concern concept in these financial statements is appropriate in the circumstances.

As set out in Note 1e, Galway University Foundation is not a subsidiary as the University did not exert control or dominant influence over its activities. However, subsequent to the financial year-end, the University appointed a Vice President for Development whose responsibilities include fundraising and alumni activities. Most of the staff of the Foundation have since transferred to the University payroll and are now under the direction of the Vice President. The impact of these changes on the University's assessment of its relationship with the Foundation will be considered in 2020.

28. Approval of financial statements

Údarás na hOllscoile approved these consolidated financial statements on 25 June 2020.

Ollscoil na hÉireann, Gaillimh - Corporate Social Responsibility (CSR)

The University's commitment to CSR is clearly demonstrated in its range of related policies and strategies that focus on regulatory compliance, professional management, ethical investment, sustainable energy, family friendly practices, community engagement, as well as EDI (equality, diversity and inclusion).

During the year, 2018/19, the University began the task of devising an updated strategy to build on its <u>Vision 2020</u> - Strategic Plan. The new plan covering 2020/2025, which is scheduled to be launched in December 2019, adopts a Values-Led approach to strategy implementation.

The plan focuses on five key values with strong links to CSR, i.e. sustainability, respect, access (openness), expert (excellence), and distinctiveness. There are clear commitments to engage positively with the city, the region, the community, and the environment.

During the year, NUI Galway was designated as a *University of Sanctuary* by Places of Sanctuary Ireland (PoSI). Under this initiative, the University joins a network of groups in local communities which share the objectives of promoting a culture of welcome and inclusiveness across Irish society for those seeking International Protection in Ireland. The University of Sanctuary steering committee at NUI Galway also includes the Irish Traveller community in its remit, with a focus on the promotion of Irish Traveller culture as an innate and positive element of Irish society, and to address the low levels of participation at second and third-level education amongst Irish Travellers.

The University's Community and University Sustainability Project (CUSP) confirmed the appointment of a fulltime coordinator in 2019 and continues its work of making Ollscoil na hÉireann, Gaillimh one of the greenest, smartest and healthiest campuses in the world.

Its commitment to sustainable energy practices resulted in formal certification of the University's Energy Management System to ISO 50001, following an energy audit carried out by Lucideon (formally known as CICS) in 2018.

A number of the University's research projects are actively involved in sustainable energy/environmentally friendly initiatives like SEAFUEL which aims to use hydrogen as a renewable car-fleet power resource and CAUSEWAY, to develop a network of natural gas/clean energy refueling facilities for the motor transport sector.

In revising its strategic approach to financial investments during the year, the University updated its policy to include a clear and unambiguous commitment to the United Nations Principles of Responsible Investment (UN PRI).

The directors present their report and the audited financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2019.

About Galway University Foundation

Vision

Since its establishment in 1998, Galway University Foundation CLG has been engaged in generating financial support for NUI Galway's programmes and activities from a range of private individuals and institutions. A core part of our work is in nurturing lasting relationships with donors who share NUI Galway's vision for the future.

Mission

The mission of the Foundation is to raise philanthropic funding in support of the objectives of NUI Galway. We gratefully acknowledge all of the visionary and generous individuals and organisations who have supported our activities in the year ended 30 June 2019. Their support, and the support of donors over many years, has transformed the NUI Galway campus, supported our students and funded life-changing research.

Strategy

In FY2020, the Foundation will prepare a new strategic plan to support the achievement of NUI Galway's 2020 - 2025 strategic plan.

Activities in FY2019:

The Foundation supported the following NUI Galway projects and programmes in FY2019:

Alumni Relations

During the year, Galway University Foundation continued its engagement with alumni nationally and internationally as part of its management of the Alumni Network on behalf of NUI Galway. Alumni engagement events were held in Galway, Dublin, Chicago and New York which were attended by approximately 1,300 graduates. The Alumni Relations team also engaged with approximately 70,000 graduates via social media.

Due to successful donor engagement and support, the Foundation was able to provide substantial financial support for the following NUI Galway projects:

Mainstreaming Programme Student Scholarships Medical Research Innovation Programmes Other Programmatic Student Sports Clubs & Societies Research Lectureships

Financial Review

The results for the year are set out in the Statement of Financial Activities on page 12.

Incoming Resources

Total income for FY2019 was €2.83M (2018: €3.50M) which comprised of:

- Donor Income €2.33M (2018: €2.42M)
- Interest & Similar Income €1.90M (2018: €1.43M)
- Movement on Unrealised Investment Gain (€1.40M) (2018: (€352K))
- The Foundation received no income from State sources

Expenditure

Total expenditure in FY2019 was €6.20M (2018: €27.88M)

- 86% (2018: 97%) of expenditure (€5.31M (2018: €27.03M)) related to Charitable Activities and comprised of the following:
- Transfers to NUI Galway projects €3.81M (2018: €24.26M)
- Transfers to Tusia Mainstreaming Programme €1.15M (2018: €2.48M)
- Operating expenses Other Charitable activities €351K (2018: €295K)

Beneficiaries of Charitable Expenditure included Medical Research, Student Scholarships, Innovation Programmes and student supports at NUI Galway

Other expenditure related to fundraising costs which totalled €886K (2018: €846K). Pay costs were approximately 57% (2018: 62%) of operating expenditure.

As has been the practice, the Foundation funds its operating expenses through the retention of interest and investment income, a contribution from NUI Galway (€240,000 (2018: €240,000)) towards certain operating expenses and through the application of a discretionary levy (maximum 5%) on donor income received. The application of the levy has no material effect on any donor funded projects as NUI Galway is responsible for the balance of funds required. In the financial period to 30 June 2019, the total amount levied on donor income was €5,609 (2018: €5,618). It also makes grants to projects from surplus investment income.

The net expenditure for the year after providing for depreciation amounted to (€3,370,034) (2018 – (€24,383,232)).

At the end of the year, the group had fixed and current assets of €21,241,745 (2018 - €38,260,135) and liabilities of €9,391,869 (2018 - €23,057,583). Following transfers to projects, the net assets of the group have decreased by (€3,352,676) (2018: (€24,396,862)).

Cashflow, Bank and Investment Balances

Bank and investment balances are carefully monitored by the Foundation and are subject to the Foundation's Investment Policy. At 30 June 2019, the Foundation had bank balances of €4.64M (2018: €5.71M) and investment balances of €16.37M (2018: €32.53M).

Investment Policy: The Board of the Foundation adopted its current Investment Policy in June 2014. The Board monitors performance of investments and compliance with the Investment Policy via regular reporting to both the Board's Investment Committee and the Board itself.

Borrowings policy: The Foundation does not have any bank borrowings.

Restricted and Unrestricted Funds

At 30 June 2019, the Foundation had total funds of €11.85M (2018: €15.20M). Restricted funds comprising of funds directed to specific NUI Galway projects totalled €10.27M (2018: €10.41M). Unrestricted Funds totalled €1.58M (2018: €4.79M) including operating funds.

Looking Forward

Plans and Challenges for FY2020

The Foundation will continue to work closely with a range of organisations and individuals to secure philanthropic funding for University priority projects. A number of specific initiatives are planned in order to strengthen the linkages between the University and its alumni and development functions. The Foundation will continue to actively manage any funds not yet advanced to the University in order to maximise investment returns whilst having due regard to capital protection and liquidity requirements. The Foundation is committed to full compliance with the Charities Act 2009. In 2020, the Foundation will adopt the Charities Governance Code issued by the Charities Regulator.

Risks and Risk Management

Principal Risks and Uncertainties

The directors consider that the principal risks and uncertainties faced by the group are in the following categories:

Economic risk:

The risk of the economic environment having an adverse impact on the ability of current and potential donors to contribute to the Foundation into the future.

Financial risks:

These include investment, liquidity and other financial risks. The group has budgetary and financial reporting procedures to manage these risks. The Board's audit and investment committees monitor compliance with these procedures on an ongoing basis. As the Foundation is funded through investment income, the board is managing the Foundation's funds in a conservative manner while monitoring all operating costs and procedures to ensure an appropriate cost/income ratio.

Fundraising risk:

Fundraising risk is the risk that the entity will lose the support of its principal or other funders. The group pro-actively manages its relationship with its key funders to ensure that it is protected and actively seek new funders on an ongoing basis.

Structure, Governance and Management

Legal Structure

Galway University Foundation Company Limited by Guarantee is a registered charity in Ireland. The entity is governed by its Constitution and is controlled by its Board of Directors. The Chief Executive Officer reports to the Board.

Best Practice Governance

In June 2016, the Foundation adopted The Governance Code which sets out principles of good governance for charitable organisations. The Foundation continues to monitor evolving corporate governance in the charitable sector. All operational expenditure is subject to an annual budget approved by the Board. Board approval is required for expenditure above stated limits.

In accordance with its Constitution, the Foundation is controlled by a Board of Directors who meet at least four times per annum. The Board has the power to appoint additional directors. The Board has a minimum of five members with no maximum limit on membership. Board members include the President of NUI Galway who is an ex-officio member. Other directors include graduates and friends of NUI Galway. The Board currently has two sub committees, namely the Investment Committee and the Audit Committee.

Internal controls

The Directors acknowledge their overall responsibility for the Foundation's system of internal control. This system includes financial controls, which enable the Board to meet its responsibilities for the integrity and accuracy of the Foundation's accounting records.

The Board acknowledges their wider responsibility to maintain, review and report on all internal controls including operational as well as financial.

Key elements of the internal control system include:

- Board approved policies and procedures are in place to govern processes relating to donations, income, expenditure, treasury, fixed assets and travel and subsistence;
- · All policies and procedures are documented and communicated to staff;
- · Organisational structure in place with defined roles, responsibilities and segregation of duties; and
- The Audit Committee reports to the Board on all aspects of controls and risks.

Galway University Foundation CLG is a registered charity (CHY number 12894) and is exempt from Corporation tax.

The group owns 100% of Galway University Foundation Inc, a company incorporated in the United States of America. Galway University Foundation Inc. is a not-for-profit organisation that seeks to provide support for the mission and objectives of NUI Galway.

Post Statement of Financial Position Events

On October 1st 2019, the Foundation concluded an agreement with NUI Galway relating to the transfer of certain business functions and related employees from the Foundation to the University in order to strengthen linkages between the University and its alumni and development functions. The Foundation has undertaken to make a donation of €400,000 in support of the University's development activities by 30th December 2019. The Foundation will continue to receive donations in support of NUI Galway and to act as the custodian of such donor funds.

The auditors, Mazars, (Chartered Accountants & Statutory Audit Firm) have indicated their willingness to continue in office in accordance with the provisions of section 383(2) of the Companies Act 2014.

Statement on relevant audit information

In the case of each of the persons who are directors at the time this report is approved in accordance with section 332 of Companies Act 2014:

- (a) so far as each director is aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the group's statutory auditors are

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

Galway University Foundation Company Limited by Guarantee (Galway University Foundation CLG) is a company limited by guarantee and does not have a share capital. The company was incorporated in the Republic of Ireland and is a registered charity (CRA 20038823). The address of the registered office is Gate Lodge, University Road, Galway. The principal activity for which the group is established is engaging in fundraising activities for the purposes of the furtherance of education and research carried out by the National University of Ireland, Galway, in its pursuit of education, teaching and research.

The consolidated financial statements comprising the Consolidated Statement of Financial Activity, the Consolidated Statement of Financial Position, the Company Statement of Financial Position, the Consolidated Statement of Changes in Equity, the Company Statement of Changes in Equity, the Consolidated Statement of Cash Flows and the related notes constitute the individual financial statements of Galway University Foundation CLG for the financial year ended 30 June 2019.

The financial statements have been presented in Euro (€) which is also the functional currency of the group and rounded to the nearest Euro.

In order to provide information relevant to understanding the stewardship of the directors and the performance and financial position of the charity, Galway University Foundation CLG has prepared its financial statements in accordance with the formats provided for in the Charities SORP.

As permitted by section 291(3)(4) of the Companies Act 2014, the Group has varied the standard formats specified in that Act for the Statement of Financial Activities, the Statement of Financial Position and the Statement of Cash Flows. Departures from the standard formats, as outlined in the Companies Act 2014, are to comply with the requirements of the Charities SORP and are in compliance with Sections 4.7, 10.6 and 15.2 of the Charities SORP. The Company has taken advantage of the exemption available to it under section 304 of the Companies Act 2014, which permits a company that publishes its company and group financial statements together not to present its own statement of financial activities and related notes.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material in relation to the group's financial statements.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements of the group for the year ended 30 June 2019 have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" (FRS 102). The financial statements have also been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) (FRS 102) "Accounting and Reporting by Charities".

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis and in accordance with the historical cost convention except for certain financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is the Companies Act 2014 and FRS 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland" issued by the Financial Reporting Council and promulgated by the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Ireland and the Statement of Recommended Practice (Charities SORP (FRS102)) as published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales and the Office of the Scottish Regulator which is recognised by the UK Accounting Standards Board (ASB) as the appropriate body to issue SORPs for the charity sector in the UK. Financial reporting in line with SORP is considered best practice for charities in Ireland. As noted above, the directors consider that the adoption of the SORP requirements is the most appropriate accounting to properly reflect and disclose the activities of the organisation.

Income

All income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the group is entitled to the income, the amount can be measured with reasonable accuracy and receipt is probable. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Fundraising Income: Fundraising income is credited to the Statement of Financial Activities in the year in which it is receivable by the group.

Donations and legacies: Voluntary income including donations, gifts and legacies are recognised where there is entitlement, receipt is probable, and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Such income is only deferred when the donor specifies that the grant or donation must only be used in future accounting periods or the donors have imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

Investment Income: Income earned on funds held on deposit or in short-term or long-term funds is treated as income and is credited when earned.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred and is recorded as part of the expenditure to which it relates. Cost of raising funds comprises the costs associated with attracting voluntary income.

Expenditure on charitable activities is those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them, including alumni activities.

Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity. Where costs cannot be directly attributed, they have been allocated in proportion to estimated benefits received.

Support costs arise from those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. Support costs include finance, ICT, administration, legal and compliance fees. Costs are charged to each service and activity in proportion to expenditure, which is considered to reflect estimated benefits received. Costs are not allocated to designated or capital funds.

Financial Instruments

Financial assets - initial recognition:

Investments are recognised initially at fair value which is normally the transaction price excluding transaction costs

Investments in the share capital of group companies are treated as non-monetary investments and are shown at cost less provision for permanent impairment, if required.

Cash and cash equivalents are included in the statement of financial position at cost. Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand and short term deposits with a maturity up to three months.

Subscriptions made to the Seed and Early Stage Equity Funds and MedTech Accelerator Fund 1 are expensed as incurred as these subscriptions are viewed as being contributions to the innovative business community, in support of NUI Galway's strategy in this area. Returns earned from these funds will be recognised as income if and when received.

At the end of the reporting period, if the fair value can be measured reliably, the investments are measured at fair value through the Statement of Financial Activity.

Income from fixed assets, together with any related tax credit, is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activity in the year in which it is receivable.

Provisions

A provision is recognised in the statement of financial position when the group has a present obligation (either legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, and it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. Provisions are measured at the directors best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the obligation at the statement of financial position date and are discounted to present value where the effect is material.

A contingent liability is not recognised but is disclosed where the existence of the obligation will only be confirmed by future events or where it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation or where the amount of the obligation cannot be measured with reasonable reliability.

Related Party Transactions

Related party transactions are disclosed in accordance with FRS 102 section 33 - Related Party Disclosures.

Tangible Fixed Assets and depreciation

Tangible Fixed Assets are stated at cost, less accumulated depreciation. The charge to depreciation is calculated to write off the original cost of equipment, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:

Office Equipment

33.33% Straight Line

The carrying values of tangible assets are reviewed annually for impairment in periods if events or changes in circumstances indicate the carrying value may not be recoverable.

Intangible Assets

Intangible Assets are valued at cost less accumulated depreciation. At each reporting date the directors consider the impairment of the software costs, any impairment charge is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activity.

Financial assets

Investments held as non-current assets are stated at cost less provision for any permanent diminution in value. Income from other investments together with any related withholding tax is recognised in the income and expenditure account in the year in which it is receivable.

Current asset investments are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest method less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts except where the effect of discounting would be immaterial. In such cases the receivables are stated at cost less impairment losses for bad and doubtful debts.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the Statement of Financial Position bank overdrafts are shown within Creditors.

Trade and other creditors

Trade and other creditors are initially recognised at fair value and thereafter stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method, unless the effect of discounting would be immaterial, in which case they are stated at cost.

The Foundation and University have an agreed policy in respect of the drawdown of funds by the University. Following the receipt of an authorised drawdown request from the University and approval by the Board of the Foundation, the requested amount is transferred from Restricted Funds to Creditors.

Employee benefits

The group operates a defined contribution pension scheme. The assets of the scheme are held separately from those of the group in an independently administered fund.

Taxation

Galway University Foundation CLG is a registered charity (CHY number 12894) and is exempt from Corporation tax.

Foreign currencies

Foreign currency transactions are initially recognised by applying to the foreign currencies amount the spot exchange rate between the functional currency and the foreign currency at the date of the transaction.

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in a foreign currency at the Statement of Financial Position date are translated using the closing rate. The resulting exchange differences are dealt with in the Statement of Financial Activity.

Short Term Benefits

Short term benefits, including holiday pay and other similar non-monetary benefits are recognised as an expense in the period in which the service is received. A liability is recognised to the extent of any unused holiday pay entitlement which is accrued at the Statement of Financial Position date and carried forward to future periods. This is measured at the undiscounted salary cost of the future holiday entitlement so accrued at the Statement of Financial Position date.

Charity's funds

Restricted Funds: Restricted funds are funds received which can only be used for particular purposes specified by the donors and are binding on the group. Such purposes are within the overall aims of the group.

Unrestricted Funds: Unrestricted funds are those which are expendable at the discretion of the group in furtherance of any of the objects of the charity. If part of an unrestricted fund is earmarked for a particular project, it may be designated as a separate fund, but the designation has an administrative purpose only, and does not legally restrict the group's discretion to apply the fund.

Designated Funds: Designated funds consist primarily of funds which have been allocated towards the funding of the group's operating activities and/or in support of the Foundation's Charitable objectives and may be utilised at the discretion of the Board for those purposes.

Basis of consolidation

The consolidated financial statements include the financial statements of the holding company and all its subsidiary companies made up to 30 June 2019.

3. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING JUDGEMENTS AND KEY SOURCES OF ESTIMATION UNCERTAINTY

Management is required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based in historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The key sources of estimation uncertainty that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements relates to the stating of financial assets at market value, which is based on independent valuations obtained.

The directors consider that apart from the accounting policies above, there are no other accounting estimates and assumptions which are required to be disclosed.

23. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Included in income for the year is an amount of €145,020 (2018: €136,745) received in the form of donations from board members or companies associated with board members.

NUI Galway: The Foundation is engaged in fund raising activities in support of National University of Ireland, Galway. Galway University Foundation CLG is an independent body which is not controlled by NUI Galway. During the year, the Foundation committed €3,252,317 (2018: €23,506,411) in support of the University. During the year the Foundation received a contribution of €240,000 (2018: €240,000) from the University towards certain operating expenses. At 30 June 2019, €9,286,863 (2018: €22,857,403) was outstanding including amounts committed in prior years. Amounts paid and payable to NUI Galway are reflected in these financial statements. As has been the practice, no remuneration has been paid to any staff member of NUI Galway.

24. FINANCIAL COMMITMENTS

During the year ended 30 June 2011, Galway University Foundation CLG became a limited partner in the Bank Of Ireland Seed and Early Stage Equity Fund 2009. The partnership is made up of the following entities; Scribe Holdings Limited, Enterprise Ireland, The University of Limerick Foundation and Galway University Foundation CLG. As at the 30 June 2019, Galway University Foundation CLG has subscribed €905,867 (2018: €885,554) and is committed to subscribe a further €94,133 (2018: €114,446) to the said partnership, bringing the total commitment to €1,000,000, which equates to 3.125% (2018: 3.125%) of the total investment value. The remaining payments from the designated reserves will be over a number of years; the exact timing of which has not yet been determined

Similarly, on 4 December 2017, the Foundation became a limited partner in the Medtech Accelerator Fund 1 Limited Partnership. During the year ended 30 June 2019, the Foundation contributed €225,000 (2018: €225,000) to that fund out of a total commitment of €450,000. This has left a remaining commitment at year end of nil (2018: €225,000).

25. CONTROLLING INTEREST

In the opinion of the directors, there is no one identifiable controlling party of the group.

26. EVENTS AFTER END OF REPORTING PERIOD

On October 1st 2019, the Foundation concluded an agreement with NUI Galway relating to the transfer of certain business functions and related employees from the Foundation to the University in order to strengthen linkages between the University and its alumni and development functions. The Foundation has undertaken to make a donation of €400,000 in support of the University's development activities by 30th December 2019. The Foundation will continue to receive donations in support of NUI Galway and to act as the custodian of such donor funds.

Tá €10m eile á choinneáil i bhfoirm airgead tirim faoi mhaoirseacht ár mbainisteoirí infheistíochta.

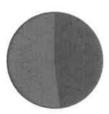

Galway University Foundation (GUF) is a company limited by guarantee and a registered charity. Its primary function is to generate financial and other supports for the University. The Foundation is not controlled by NUI Galway and does not receive any funding either from NUI Galway or the State for its fundraising activities.

GUF funds its operating expenses through the application of a discretionary levy on donor income and through investment income. GUF is a major contributor to the University's capital and recurrent activities and its annual report and audited accounts are available on its website. GUF policy is to make funds available to the University following completion of capital projects and expenditure on recurrent projects. Funds are transferred in accordance with agreed formal procedures.

The University is closely monitoring the impact of the coronavirus COVID-19 outbreak that struck Europe in March 2020, following a similar outbreak in China in late December 2019.

While the fundamental concern is the safety and wellbeing of students, staff, and our campus community, the University is developing mitigation plans to deal with the financial impact of the evolving crisis.

In addition to Income & Expenditure sensitivity analysis, we are modelling severe stress tests on our loan covenants and we believe that we will have the necessary flexibility to honour those covenants.

Bursar's Report

Bursar's Report on HEA 'Harmonised' Financial Statements Introduction

The attached financial statements are prepared under sector agreed 'HEA Harmonised' accounting policies & principles that reflect the teaching, research and related service activities of the University. The external audit report by KPMG at pages 6-7 (Gaeilge) and 32-33 (English) records their opinion that the statements have been properly prepared in accordance with those policies.

Overview

The University is pleased once again to report an operating surplus of €1.6m for the year ended 30th September 2019 (2018: €0.4m). The University continues to effectively manage its affairs and associated risks against a backdrop of limited Government funding. The uncertain impact of Britain's exit from the EU continues to pose a major threat to the Irish economy with potential negative financial impacts nationally and correspondingly for the University.

As demographic projections have shown, the trend is for increasing numbers of second level students taking the leaving certificate examination coupled with increases in the proportion progressing to third level education. These trends are reflected in attached accounts as noted below under 'Operating Results'. The general economic outlook remains favourable with buoyant fiscal returns and the number of people on the 'live register' (availing of or claiming unemployment assistance) at its lowest level for the past decade.

As the University launches its ambitious strategic plan for the coming five years, it does so with an increased emphasis on non-state income streams. Foremost in this category is that of Post graduate and non-EU student fees as well as high standard 'on-campus' student accommodation and associated summer lettings.

Operating Results

The reported surplus for the year at €1.6m is attributable in no small part to increased fee income and well controlled costs. Fee income has risen by €6m due to a combination of increased student numbers, increased fees and a change in mix of students, which has also generated additional Government Grant income via the 'RGAM' funding mechanism. Staff costs have increased by €16m during the year due to a mix of increased Contract Research, restoration of pay cuts, annual increments, actuarial impacts for pension and increased staff headcount.

Liquidity

The continuing strong level of liquidity displayed in the Statement of Financial Position reflects the business model in which the University operates with much of its core funding being 'front loaded'. One cause of concern, across the sector, is the balance due from Government in relation to pensions as can be seen in the increase in pension debtor in 2019 (Note 21) which has risen to €7.4m (2018: €2.8m).

Cash & Investments

During the year the University approved an investment strategy and appointed new investment advisors and investment managers. The physical transfer of funds was taking place at the end of the financial year resulting in a higher cash balance than usual. Within two months of the year-end, a total

of €50m was under investment in medium and long-term instruments. A further €10m is held in cash under the stewardship of our investment managers.

Bursar's Report (continued)

Significant Capital Developments

September 2018 saw the opening of Goldcrest, our new student residence comprising of 429 beds. This resulted in a significant increase in rental income for the University during the year. The income is used to service the European Investment Bank (EIB) loan interest and repayments, the first capital repayment falling due in July 2020. In June 2019, we drew down a further €21m, the second tranche of the EIB loan. This will facilitate commencement of development and construction of Goldcrest II (674 beds), for which planning permission was granted during the year.

The University secured €15m towards its learning commons, a reimagined library space for the twenty first century. The funding was a result of a competitive bid to the Higher Education Authority's Strategic Initiative Fund (HESIF). Realisation of the project, over the coming years, will require investment of both Philanthropy and University funds.

The University also embarked on a project to replace its twenty-year old student records system and at the end of 2019 we will conclude an essential investment in the maintenance of our historic and iconic Quadrangle building.

Conclusion

While the range of challenges facing the University are many and varied, its continued success is assured by virtue of its committed teams who deliver day in, day out, on its strategic objectives, high teaching and research standards, and professional services.

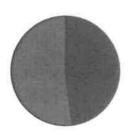

1. Report on the audit of the Funding Statements

Opinion

We have audited the HEA Funding Statements ("Funding Statements") of the National University of Ireland, Galway ('the University') for the year ended 30 September 2019 which comprise the Income and Expenditure Account, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and the related notes. We are independent of the University in accordance with ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of Funding Statements in Ireland, including the Ethical Standard issued by the Irish Auditing and Accounting Supervisory Authority (IAASA), and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

We have nothing to report on going concern

We are required to report to you if we have concluded that the use of the going concern basis of accounting is inappropriate or there is an undisclosed material uncertainty that may cast significant doubt over the use of that basis for a period of at least twelve months from the date of approval of the Funding Statements. We have nothing to report in these respects.

Other information

The University is responsible for the other information presented in the Annual Report together with the Funding Statements. The other information comprises the information included in the Bursar's report and the financial highlights. The Funding Statements and our auditor's report thereon do not comprise part of the other information. Our opinion on the Funding Statements does not cover the other information and, accordingly, we do not express an audit opinion or, except as explicitly stated below, any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Our responsibility is to read the other information and, in doing so, consider whether, based on our Funding Statements audit work, the information therein is materially misstated or inconsistent with the Funding Statements or our audit knowledge. Based solely on that work we have not identified material misstatement in the other information.

Opinions on other matters on which we are required to report under the terms of our engagement

We have obtained all the information and explanations which we consider necessary for the purposes of our audit. The Funding Statements are in agreement with the accounting records and, in our opinion, adequate accounting records have been kept by the University.

Statement of Accounting Policies

A Financial Statements

The Financial Statements reflect the teaching, research and related service activities of the University. The Financial Statements of the University's pension schemes and of the University's financially independent ancillary activities are prepared annually and audited separately.

B Accounting Convention

The Financial Statements are prepared under the historical cost convention modified to include the revaluation of land and buildings. They are prepared so as to present the University's financial information in accordance with the existing Harmonisation of Financial Statements agreement as adopted for all Irish Universities. These accounting policies have been designed to give effect to the Harmonisation of Financial Statements agreement.

The Harmonisation of Financial Statements agreement does not comply with generally-accepted accounting practice (GAAP). Consolidated financial statements that comply with GAAP are prepared separately.

C State Grants for Recurrent Expenditure

Recurrent Grants have been recognised on an accruals basis. Recurrent Grant which has been used for the purchase of fixed assets is transferred to the General Reserve.

D Grants for Capital Expenditure

State Grants approved by the Higher Education Authority for capital expenditure are included in the Financial Statements of the period to the extent of cash received.

Other capital expenditure grants are accrued following the completion of the related capital project or to the extent of cash received, depending on the associated terms and conditions of the project agreement.

E Fee and Interest Income

Fee income (including student levies receivable) is accounted for on an accruals basis and reported net of reductions in the fee income line in the income and expenditure account.

Interest income is recorded on an accruals basis in the period to which it relates.

F Approved Allocations

The Income and Expenditure Account is prepared on an accruals basis with the following exceptions:

- (i) non-pay expenditure of academic departments and certain service departments;
- (ii) departmental equipment and minor works.

In these cases, expenditure is included on the basis of approved budgets and internal balances are carried forward in the Balance Sheet under Current Assets or Liabilities, as appropriate.

Statement of Accounting Policies cont'd

G Fixed Assets and Depreciation

All fixed assets are stated at historical cost with the exception of Land and Buildings. Buildings that were completed at 30 September 1998 were revalued internally, on an individual basis, at the current replacement value at that date less the related depreciation charge. Buildings constructed during the year are stated at their historical cost and are assumed to have a useful life of 50 years. Land was also revalued at current use value at 30 September 1998.

Buildings under construction are accounted for at cost, based on the value of architects' certificates and other direct costs incurred to the financial year end. They are not depreciated until they are brought into use.

Equipment costing less than €10,000 per individual item is written off to the income and expenditure account in the year of acquisition.

The estimated useful lives of fixed assets by reference to which depreciation has been calculated on a straight-line basis are as follows: -

Buildings	50 years
Computer Equipment	3 years
Furniture and Equipment	5 years
Land is not depreciated	

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of the fixed asset may not be recoverable.

H General Reserve

The general reserve represents the value of funding, after amortisation, applied for capital purposes, together with the results from Ancillary Services.

I Research Grants and Projects

Contract research expenditure is shown net of contributions to indirect costs. Income from contract research grants is included in the Income and Expenditure account to the extent that the related expenditure has been incurred. Contract research contribution to the University's indirect costs is included in 'other income'. Fixed Assets financed from contract research grants are capitalised in the balance sheet

J Foreign Currencies

Costs denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the exchange rates ruling at the dates of the transactions. Assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into Euro at the rates of exchange ruling at the Balance Sheet date. The resulting profits or losses are dealt with in the Income and Expenditure account.

Statement of Accounting Policies cont'd

K Taxation

No provision has been made for taxation, as the University holds tax exempt status.

L Ancillary Services

Ancillary Services are services provided on campus on a cost recovery basis, and are planned to breakeven in the medium term. Investment income on the infrastructural Development fund is included under this heading. The net outturn on such activities is transferred to the General Reserve account.

M Pensions

The University operates the following defined-benefit pension schemes: Joint Pension Scheme (JPS or 'Funded Scheme'); Model Pension Scheme (MPS or 'Model Scheme') and the Single Public Service Pension Scheme ('Single Scheme'). The basic retirement pensions of members are funded by contributions at pre-determined rates of pensionable pay. Increases in basic retirement pensions are charged to the Income and Expenditure account of the University. Employer contributions to the defined benefit schemes are charged to the income and expenditure account of the University in tandem with the employees' salary and wage costs. The net cash flow position of both defined benefit schemes combined, is accounted for as an asset or liability as appropriate and the funds are paid to or accrued as due from the Irish State. The cash flows of both schemes are detailed in the notes to the accounts.

A Personal Retirement Savings Account (PRSA) pension facility is also available for staff not eligible for enrolment in the defined-benefit schemes. It is administered by a third party insurance company.

N Stock

Stocks, the majority of which are laboratory consumables, stationery and building materials, are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

O Investments

Investments are stated at their historical cost less provision for impairment, if any. These include cash balances held within investment portfolios.
