Section 1

Priority Updates to Údarás na hOllscoile

- University of Galway has been named as one of the top Universities in Europe, according to the QS
 World University Rankings: Europe 2024, placing us 98th in Europe out of 690 institutions across 42 locations, and also placed in the Top 50 for Sustainability, ranking us 36th. This accolade follows the University ranked number one university in Ireland, and in the world's top 50, for progress towards the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) by Times Higher Education (THE) Impact Rankings and becoming a national Sustainable Development Goals Champion.
- University of Galway recently announced a new partnership with the National Breast Cancer
 Research Institute (NBCRI), with the charity committing a €2 million research investment fund over two years. The collaboration builds on a longstanding relationship between NBCRI and the University.
- University of Galway has been awarded €1.3 million Performance Funding from the HEA further to submission of a case study which outlines the pioneering and innovative work of the Active* Consent programme. The Performance Funding 2023 awards were announced at the launch on 25 September 2023 of the HEA's System Performance Framework 2023 - 2028.

University of Galway is one of only 5 institutions awarded funding under the HEA initiative and the only one to have been successful in securing HEA performance funding in all four rounds of allocation, totalling almost €4 million.

- Signature Partnership Agreement University of Galway / Medtronic: University of Galway and Medtronic PLC, a global leader in healthcare technology, have entered into a five-year €5 million signature innovation partnership focused on three pillars: developing the MedTech ecosystem, STEM and research. This marks the first signature partnership between University of Galway and industry and one of the largest corporate gifts in the history of our university. At the time of the writing of this report, the announcement is to be made at a special event at National University of Ireland in Dublin. In attendance: President, Professor Ciarán Ó hÓgartaigh, CEO Medtronic, Geoff Martha, Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, Simon Harris, and Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly.
- Dean of Students: Professor Ciara Meehan joined us on 4 September at the beginning of the new academic year as our new Dean of Students. Ciara was appointed after an external competition which attracted a very strong field. This is an exciting appointment to this important role for us and for our students. We welcome and support Ciara in her new role.

- Further to the IUA's submission to DFHERIS, the President attended a series of meetings in recent months, along with IUA Council members, with Minister Simon Harris, DFHERIS in relation to Funding the Future campaign and on infrastructure investment. Some €100million was allocated to the sector in core funding which still leaves a shortfall of €200million per annum. Minister Donohue mentioned the potential for the National Training Fund (which has €1.5billion unspent) to be allocated more broadly. We continue to work to ensure the investment in education which our students and our society deserve.
- The President and the HEA jointly signed the **Anti-Racism Principles for Irish Education Institutions** at an event on campus on 27 June 2023. Attending from the HEA were senior representatives from the HEA Centre of Excellence for Equality, Diversity and Inclusion.
- Dr Alan Wall, CEO of the HEA and Dr Victoria Brownlee, HEA Senior Manager in System Development and Performance Management visited the campus on 26 July 2023 to meet with the President, the Bursar, the Secretary for Governance & Academic Affairs and colleagues from the College of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences to discuss the Expressions of Interest process further to the HEA call to identify opportunities to build capacity in healthcare programmes.
- The President attended the Audit and Risk Committee on 25 September 2023 at which he provided UMT's collective and considered feedback and input on the Audit Plan 2023 2024.
- The first All Staff meeting of the academic year 2023 24 took place on 27 September. Topics included: An Update on University Finances; Greener Commuting; a Panel Discussion Spotlight on Research Building on Galway's reputation for medtech, creativity and marine, with an opportunity for Questions and Answers.
- Galway International Arts Festival (GIAF): University of Galway continued to partner with GIAF as a major sponsor and support of the festival, being the exclusive 'Education Partner'. This year there was a very substantial University of Galway presence. Event space was provided at many locations throughout the campus with a significant footfall due to number of notable events:
 - The Festival Theatre aka the Kingfisher where there was a 70-person show in a 1000+ seat theatre, the largest ever theatre built west of the Shannon, and which brought in the region of 20,000 people to the campus.
 - Bedbound, starring Colm Meaney, in the Bailey Allen Hall with another 10,000 or people on campus.
 - Seven concerts at the Big Top in Fisheries Field, bringing another 20,000+ people onto our campus.
- The ENLIGHT alliance (consisting of 10 universities from 10 European countries, including University of Galway, successfully secured 4-year funding of €14.4 million European Commission funding.

 Thriving in Academic Leadership: Emerald Publishing has published the collective book *Thriving in Academic Leadership* (13 October 2023) which includes a chapter by the President, Professor Ciarán Ó hÓgartaigh. Other contributors include Vice-Chancellor of Murdoch University, Professor Andrew Deeks; former President of University of Windsor, Ross Paul; Principal of Mansfield College, Oxford, Helen Mountfield KC; Professor in History, Brooklyn College, Swapna Banerjee; Director of the Centre for Health Systems, University of Otago, Professor Robin Gauld; Professor of Operations Management, Singapore Management University, Arnoud De Meyer; Vice-Chancellor, University of Cape Town, Professor Majokgethi Phakeng; former President University of Massachusetts, Professor John Lombardi; and retired President, Effat University, Saudi Arabia, Marcia Grant.

The book is a set of reflections for academics who aspire to leadership or are currently in leadership positions.

1. GENERAL INSTITUTIONAL ITEMS FOR THE ATTENTION OF ÚDARÁS NA hOLLSCOILE

1.1 HR REVIEW – ACTION UPDATE

The HR Review Working Group which is working to progress the issues highlighted in the HR Review by PwC commenced its work during the summer and an action plan was developed under the six theme areas identified.

Overall, regarding the key items that were raised in the area:

- The draft **People Strategy** has been updated from the last round of feedback, the next phase is consultation with the UMT nominated policy review group, and with individual UMT members. An update will be discussed at UMT at its meeting (31st October) and to EDIHRC (23rd November) and Údarás na hOllscoile (18th December 2023).
- The **recruitment** backlog is now well under control, and internally within the recruitment teams have been reorganised with teams created to deal with **Research**, **Academic**, **Professional Service** streams of recruitment.
- **Policy reviews**: Policies have been reviewed and updated and will be reviewed for feedback by the policy review group over the coming weeks, and then to UMT for approval.
- The University Performance Management Framework has been launched, information sessions delivered, and currently reviewer and reviewee training courses are being delivered.
- The **culture and morale group** have been working with remarkable engagement of the team on the action plan and various social events have been planned.
- We are currently working on **process mapping the recruitment process**, with a view to engaging a Lean expert to train the HR Team on Lean processes and then to review the recruitment process with a view of eliminating any bottlenecks.
- Planned engagement with College Deans on the role of the **HR Business Partners**: The Director of HR is scheduling one-to-one meetings with the College Deans, and then with other UMT leaders that have a HRBP and those who do not, to consider the enhancement of the HR Business Partner services across the University.
- **Improving communications** within the HR Team with fortnightly emails and updating the team on activities, and ongoing work, with input is coming from the HR Managers.
- A monthly HR Update All Staff email is circulated to staff on various items from policy updates, wellbeing events, and training activities.
- A **HR Staff coffee morning for new staff** took place on Wednesday 20th September for new staff who have joined over the past two years. The event was attended by over 100 staff, the President

and various staff networks also attended. This will become an event that we will run in the future in Semester 1 and Semester 2. The next event planned for Semester 2 is now being planned.

• A **UMT HR Review working group** has been formed. It has met once thus far and will support the overseeing of the action plans. This group will provide feedback and work with the Director of HR to design what the future HR Office will be to support University business.

1.2 CAPITAL PROGRAMME AND FACILITIES UPDATE

Dunlin (Student Accommodation Phase 2):

This project is now complete and operational under the management of Atalia.



Masterplan this document is now complete and ready for presentation to the University Management Team.

City Campus (Nuns' Island): we have received funding under URDF 2 for a variety of projects on our City Campus and are in the progress on Planning for Law School at MacLoughlin Building, Medical Facility at Hygeia, Theatre and associated student facilities at Fisheries field, as well as upgrade and public realm at Fisheries field.

We have submitted a real estate review of **Persses Distillery** to the UMT. Options are under consideration at UMT level.

Medical School: We await funding confirmation through HESIF 2 for the proposed Medical School which is to be located at the Anatomy Building and will consist of a 40,000sqft 2-storey structure incorporating the existing structure. We await formal confirmation of the award and drawdown.

Planning has been received on the **Learning Commons** at University of Galway. At present, we are at detailed design stage, with enabling works tender and contractor re-qualification due by end of 2023.

There are 28 large development projects at various stages of assessment by the buildings development team; these involve consideration, feasibility, and design, which are conducted by the four members of the

PDU unit. This is a staggering workload for such a group and the Buildings and Estates team are anxious to agree priortisation on projects as it is difficult to manage expectations across the campus.

The HESIF quarterly report issued to the HEA in September 2023. This report has advised the HEA of the decision to progress the alternative delivery option and has provided a status update on the procurement of the Project Team. Engineering works, Site Investigation works, Environmental surveys have completed for the most part on the selected Distillery Road site.

The Clinical Simulation Project, Business Hub and Aras Moyola are now commissioned.

A further phase of **Campus Flood Protection** works has been completed. This forms part of a wider flood prevention mitigation plan that has been rolled out on the campus over the past number of years and directly ties into the Catchment Flood Risk Assessment and Management programme connected with the River Corrib.

The **facilities team** continues to do an excellent job, the physical works carried out and recent work around the conferring ceremonies was of the highest standard. The team has carried out some projects to support student non-commercial space; a number of these additions will be delivered in this quarter, including, outdoor meeting pods, upgraded garden areas with additional seating, drinking water bottle fill stations and outdoor classrooms.

Safe Zone app has been launched for the benefit of all staff and students. A lit route now runs from campus through Dunlin 2 and the park and ride and on to the Dangan sports ground.

We are working through over 176 project requests from across the community, these take the form of large, medium and small works, which all have their challenges and technical requirements. We are focusing on a sequence of accessibility projects including making all theatres accessible, installing additional automatic doors, upgrading the lift equipment at concourse, and a variety of other day-to-day works. Projects have been completed on the accessible bike parking, extending pathways and creating new disabled spaces, and pedestrianizing areas. These projects take time but there is a keen focus on accessibility across campus.

The team has been engaging with Galway City Council Tourism Head and Bord Fáilte to assess opportunities to tie campus improvement and development works with tourism opportunities up to and including Fisheries field project, merchandising and the active travel routes.

We have completed a student accommodation demand, supply study for the HEA, and are in process of creating a space utilization study across campus for same body.

Over the summer months the team has completed basketball court at Engineering green and pedestrianisation of the north to south route, the Sensory Room, Dean's Corridor at Science/Engineering, Biz Hub at Cairnes Building, Ideas Lab and Student Enquiry Centre on the Concourse, and added a significant number of student social seating spaces throughout campus.

Excellent work has been conducted on the structures of the Anatomy building, the Quadrangle, CSI building and the Arts Science Concourse, this is work that goes unnoticed but ensures that the buildings remain operational. Works such as façade repairs, roof replacement and a variety of conservation works, such as window replacement, have been completed.

A large volume of work is in progress to retain the ISO certification on energy management and commencement of same on the health and safety function in buildings. We have retained the **Green flag** for the campus and we have also been awarded **Grade A standard for campus cleanliness by Galway City Council.**






Distillery Channel before and after.

University of Galway's Monitoring and Reporting Glidepath 2006 - 2030






University of Galway's Energy & Carbon related journey 2006 to date






University of Galway's Kg of CO2 equivalent per student 2006 - 2030



Courtyards' Projects

We revitalised the Arts Science courtyards. Sustainable composite social seating was installed where possible to encourage use by staff and students. There is a strong focus on pollinator friendly and sensory planting, and the mulch used in the courtyards is generated from our green waste. The overall aim is to create opportunities to connect students and staff to the natural environment for health and wellbeing.



Social Seating Project

Built from polycarbonate domes the sustainable composite social seating and roof covered benches are used to encourage outdoor learning/teaching on campus. Many of these are located in courtyard areas beside buildings for convenience and shelter from the elements.





Landscape Projects and the Green Flag for Parks and Landscape 2021/22

Landscape enhancements during 2021/22 include resurfacing of our Riverside Walk, replenishment of beds all over campus and a reimagining of the award winning Cardiovascular themed garden by Professor Derek O'Keefe at Bloom 2022.





Circular Economy Green Waste Project

We introduced a circular economy initiative to take green waste such as grass, hedge cuttings and leaves collected from the grounds to our waste contractors composting facility. Here it is mixed with food waste from our restaurants to create an organic fertilizer which is used on the campus.



Electric Park and Ride Shuttle Buses



The newly awarded park and ride shuttle service contract will benefit from two electric buses from the start of next term, September 2023.

Bike Parking Facilities

To coincide with National Bike Week 2023, the University of Galway formally opened its bespoke bicycle parking for persons with impaired mobility, and family friendly child carrying trailers and/or cargo bike parking.

The project delivers on all pillars of the University Strategy, which are, Respect, Openness, Sustainability and Excellence. We strive for excellence and build on universal design principles in our developments across our campus and enhance physical access for all our communities and visitors alike.



Outdoor Gym's Across Campus

The all-weather gyms were launched in 2022 and include exercise bikes, leg, chest and shoulder presses, rowing machines, cross trainers, walkers, and steppers and promote health and wellbeing.

1.3 UPDATE ON RANKINGS

New QS European Rankings 2024

On 20th of September 2023, QS Released their inaugural QS World University Rankings Europe and **University of Galway was ranked 98th in Europe** and 3rd in Ireland, out of 698 institutions across Europe, including 8 in Ireland:

This European focused rank uses similar metrics to the overall QS World University Rank 2024, but with some additional metrics measuring international diversity of the student body and international student exchange.

THE WUR Ranking 2024:

On 27th September Times Higher Education (THE) released their 2024 World University Ranking results.

University of Galway remained in the rank range 301-350 this year out of nine institutions in Ireland (same as last year).

Five of the Irish Universities all remained the same this year also, whereas TCD improved 27 places to a rank of 134 and University of Limerick also rose over 100 places to a range of 401-500. RCSI however declined into the lower range of 251-300.

This year THE introduced 4 new metrics around research quality (based off research citation metrics) and metric which were positive for all Irish universities, in particular TCD.

2. OUR UNIVERSITY COMMUNITY: STAFF AND STUDENTS

STAFF

- Congratulations to the Pharmacology Laboratory in the Human Biology who received My Green Lab Certification in July 2023. Platinum level certification was awarded after the implementation of a series of measures to improve the sustainability of practical teaching delivered in the laboratory. The team within Pharmacology and Therapeutics that led on this initiative were Dr Claire Feerick, Dr Danny Kerry, Coralie Mureau, and Professor David Finn, with much-valued guidance and support provided throughout by Dr Una Fitzgerald.
- The President and the VP for Equality, Diversity and Inclusion raised the Rainbow Flag on campus at the Quadrangle to mark **Galway Pride / Bród na Gaillimhe** on 9 August 2023. The flag-raising event was organised by the **LGBT+ Staff Network**.
- Professor Martin O'Halloran has been awarded a European Research Council (ERC) Proof of Concept grant worth €150,000. This latest accolade for Professor O'Halloran brings his total ERC awards to seven with a combined value of €4.25million in funding since 2015, making him the jointhighest ERC awardee in Ireland.
- In August, the Biseach Initiative MoU was signed. Cancer researchers at University of Galway and Notre Dame's Harper Cancer Research Institute have come together to establish the Biseach Initiative, a strategic cancer research collaboration which aims to build on the ideas, talent and infrastructure of both universities for global cancer impact.
- Four University of Galway researchers were presented with prestigious Lero Director Prizes at a special ceremony in August: Dr Anastasia Griva (Business Information Systems); Dr Sally McHugh (School of Education); Professor Edward Jones and Professor Martin Glavin (Electrical and Electronic Engineering).
- European Research Council Grants: Dr Eoin McEvoy, an Assistant Professor in Biomedical Engineering and Dr James Gahan, who takes up an Associate Professorship in chromosome biology in 2024, have secured prestigious grant awards from the European Research Council to pursue scientific research on evolution and breast cancer.
- Professor John Morrissey (Geography) has been appointed to the InterAcademy Partnership (IAP)
 Panel on Human Security, which is currently working with the United Nations Trust Fund for Human
 Security and World Academy of Art and Science on a global campaign to promote Human Security For
 All (HS4A).

- Dr Sheila Garrity (Early Childhood Studies, School of Education, & Centre for Adult Learning and Professional Development) has been appointed to the Advisory Committee on Early Learning and Childcare in the Province of Newfoundland and Labrador, Canada by the Minister for Education, the Honourable Krista Lynn Howell. Dr Garrity will contribute to implementing the Newfoundland and Labrador Early Learning and Childcare Action Plan, in harmony with the Canada-Wide plan for Early Learning and Child Care.
- The President launched University of Galway's **Centre for Creative Technologies** on 21 September 2023. Supported by the University's Strategic Fund, the Centre fosters research and teaching activities that explore and develop links between creative practice and technology.
- Academic and Research Integrity Conference 4 6 October 2023: University of Galway hosted a
 major international conference on academic and research integrity, in partnership with the National
 Academic Integrity Network.
- **Professor FideIma Dunne**: Professor Dunne's research on the **management of gestational diabetes mellitus** received widescale media coverage across October, further to publication of the results of the EMERGE project in JAMA: the Journal of American Medical Association.

STUDENTS

- University of Galway welcomed its new Students' Union Executive in June 2023. President: Dean Kenny; Vice President/Education Officer: Raimey O'Boyle; Vice President/Welfare Officer: Izzy Tiernan; and Vice President for the Irish Language: Faye Ní Dhomhnaill, and other Officers. We wish them a successful and rewarding year ahead.
- In late June 2023, the Government announced plans for an additional 5,000 college places in medicine, nursing, pharmacy, dentistry and veterinary medicine which will begin to come on stream from next year. The Government also approved three new healthcare degrees programmes for University of Galway - Pharmacy, Graduate Entry Medicine, and Graduate Entry Nursing – which are in direct response to the needs of the healthcare sector and demand for staff, particularly in rural areas.
- University of Galway celebrated the conferring of almost 2,000 students at the Autumn conferring ceremonies (15 - 18 August 2023). A number of undergraduate, postgraduate and PhD degrees from across all four Colleges were presented.

- In early September, our new Multi-Sensory Room was launched by Adam Harris, founder and Chief Executive of Ireland's national autism organisation AsIAm. The Multi-Sensory Room was created to make the campus more inclusive and sensory-friendly.
- Approximately 3,000 first-year students were welcomed to campus on 15 September for a series of special orientation events.

Sport at University of Galway

- The Walker Cup: Fourth-year Biomedical Engineering student and golf star Liam Nolan was part of the Great Britain and Ireland Golf Team who took part in the Walker Cup Old Course in St Andrew's in September.
- Bachelor of Commerce student and amateur jockey **Billy Coonan** celebrated a win with the **Amateurs' Derby at Epsom** in August.
- World Rowing Championships (Belgrade, Serbia): The Women's Pair featured University alumna Fiona Murtagh and Aifric Keogh, who secured their boat a spot in the 2024 Paris Olympics by coming second in their semi-final.

3. COMMUNITY AND REGIONAL ENGAGEMENT

3.1 PUBLIC EVENTS / ENGAGEMENT

- The President officially opened the **14th International Disability Law Summer Schoo**l, hosted by the Centre for Disability Law and Policy (19 23 June 2023). This year's Summer School focused on the rights of children and young people with disabilities.
- The President welcomed the Tánaiste, Micheál Martin, to campus for the Government's Consultative Forum on International Security Policy, hosted in the Bailey Allen Hall at University of Galway on 23 June 2023. This was followed by lunch for the Tánaiste, Jackie McCrum, Secretary General, Department of Defence, Sonja Hyland, Deputy Secretary General, Department of Foreign Affairs, Bernie Maguire, Assistant Secretary, Department of Defence, Sharon McGowan, Tánaiste's Advisor and colleagues from our School of Law and Irish Centre for Human Rights.
- The first **Regional Dialogue** meeting coordinated by DFHERIS was hosted at the Aula Maxima on 23 June 2023. The theme was 'A More Unified Tertiary System'. In attendance were education leaders from Galway, Mayo, Roscommon and Sligo along with DFHERIS representatives.
- On 4 July 2023, the President addressed a celebratory hybrid event between Iveagh House in Dublin, University of Galway and Marine Institute: Atlantic Ocean – Our Shared Resource Marine Research, celebrating a decade of marine research cooperation along and across the Atlantic Ocean. The event was co-organised by the European Commission, the Irish Government, the Marine Institute and University of Galway.
- On 5 July 2023, the President moderated an event at the Mary Robinson Climate Conference Youth Leaders for Global Challenges in Ballina. Students from St Louis' School in Kiltimagh reported on their climate action project and young people from Comhairle na nÓg Mayo, Ballina 2023's Youth Assembly, the National Youth Assembly and the Children and Young People's Assembly on Biodiversity Loss attended. Speakers included Mary Robinson, US Ambassador to Ireland Claire Cronin and French Ambassador to Ireland Vincent Guérend.
- The President gave the welcoming address at the seminar Research and Impact on Policy, Lessons learned and Future Directions, led by Dr Fergal Lynch (Senior Lead, Government and Public Policy Engagement, Institute for Lifecourse and Society) at the Aula Maxima on 20 July 2023. An expert panel from our research community shared their insights as to how they navigated the path to policy: Professor Caroline McGregor, Professor Pat Dolan, Professor Saoirse NicGabhainn, Dr Elaine Toomey and Professor Stephen Hynes.

- The President opened the Science of Science Policy Workshop at University of Galway on 3 August 2023 and coordinated by Professor John McHale. The workshop was attended by Professor Philip Nolan, Director General, Science Foundation Ireland and included a series of workshops and presentations presented by the PI's funded under the SFI Science Policy Research Programme and panel discussions on The Future of Science Policy and Science Policy Research and Star Recruitment as an Element of the Science Policy Mix.
- University of Galway's inaugural SDG week took place 18-23 September across campus to increase awareness, engagement and action to help achieve the United Nations' 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Events included a mix of student and staff-led events, from seminars to seed sowing, an environmental summit, poster presentations, workshops, a quiz night, a guided walk and a community recycling day.
- The School of Business and Economics hosted the Irish Academy of Management Annual Conference in September, co-chaired by Dr Majella Giblin and Dr Denise Holland. The conference theme was 'Sustainable Leadership and Management: Making a Global Impact for the Public Good'. The conference concluded with the awards ceremony where Professor Alma McCarthy was the recipient of the prestigious IAM Fellowship Award for 2023.
- The Cell Explorers Coordination team, led by Dr Muriel Grenon, closed out a phenomenal academic year following a significant programme of activities. In 2022, the University of Galway team brought the Fantastic DNA workshop to 28 schools engaging with 849 pupils in 32 classes. CE engaged 410 young individuals and their families during GSTF Exhibition Day and ran several other events including the Traveller Ethnicity week with Access, Engineering week family day, Cork Carnival of Science and CURAM Curious Young Mind summer. This work is made possible through the dedication of 98 team members, mostly undergraduate volunteers, and some postgraduate and postdoctoral researchers and collaborators from the University.

In addition, the **Cell Explorers Network** has been coordinating the national network since 2015, currently 13 teams, as well as developing research on the impact of the programme.

3.2 MARKETING AND COMMUNICATIONS ACTIVITY

Brand Update

September 1st marked the first anniversary of the University's renaming. Over the summer, significant work was undertaken on University signage. With the new budget year, additional funding has become available to further embed the new brand across the campus and city. Further training of staff on brand will be rolled out in the coming months for those involved in content creation.

The recruitment campaign "Galway's the Place/ Is í Gaillimh an Áit is Fearr" for the change of mind window outperformed previous recruitment campaigns for the University on any platform where we have comparable data. The campaign consisted of Out of Home advertising, radio, digital audio, search, online display and social media advertising. Engagement with prospective students was strongest on Snapchat and Tik Tok. The 23/24 campaign is currently in development and will be focused on the University's contribution to the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals.

New Academic Year

A multi-channel communications campaign was rolled out for the commencement of the new academic year with colleagues in Student Services. In the national media, University spokespeople were prominent on the major sectoral issues facing prospective students. President Ciarán Ó hÓgartaigh, Students' Union President Dean Kenny and a number of University students spoke to <u>RTÉ Radio 1's Morning Ireland, RTÉ News Online, RTÉ News at One</u>, and <u>RTÉ Six One News</u> about student accommodation and the challenges facing third-level students ahead of the new academic year. Deputy President and Registrar Professor Pól Ó Dochartaigh expresses his concerns over Leaving Certificate grade inflation in <u>The Irish Times</u> and discussed this and CAO offers with <u>RTÉ Radio 1's News at One</u>, <u>RTÉ Radio 1's Drivetime</u>, <u>Newstalk's The Hard Shoulder</u>, and The Irish Times <u>here</u> and <u>here</u>. For our internal audiences, issues ranging from the accommodation search to how to set up a campus email account were communicated internally and through our social channels, with an emphasis on engagement with first year orientation activities.

Digital Communications

Social media engagement and following has grown over the past quarter, with engagement on Instagram, LinkedIn and TikTok, having increased by between 29% - 65%. The well-documented issues with Twitter are having an impact, with engagement reducing on that platform as our audience migrates to other platforms. The development of more frequent video content is a strain on limited resources but essential to deliver content our audiences will respond to. Vacancies within the marketing team have limited website development work over the period, with priority given to updating our audiences on news and events.

Partnerships

The partnership with Galway International Arts Festival (GIAF) resulted in more on-campus events than ever before. The sports arena was transformed for The Pulse show, while Colm Meaney starred in the sold-out run of Bedbound in the Bailey Allen Hall. University staff were heavily involved in the First Thought Talks programme and led the post-show talks across the festival theatre programme. The SELECTED programme afforded unparalleled access for our students to learn about the delivery of the festival, while the volunteering programme was embedded in Áras na Mac Léinn. An alumni event was held alongside the Saw Doctors' performance in the Big Top, while international mobile phone photography experts provided campus tours for visitors to the campus. Oral histories of the highlights were recorded by our University archivists. This partnership involved a lot of work from colleagues in Buildings & Estates, Commercial

Services, Creative Arts, Library Archives as well as the Engagement team. Content on our social platforms relating to the festival had almost 700,000 impressions (views), with an engagement rate of 3.8% (likes, shares, comments etc), which is significantly above industry averages.

The University's partnership with <u>the Conversation platform</u> resulted in the publication of articles on whistleblowing, AI in courtrooms and online abuse of female politicians.

Sixteen articles were published by University academics on <u>RTÉ's Brainstorm</u> platform over the period, on subjects as diverse as PSNI data breaches and the history of Irish budgets.

- Gestational Diabetes: Researchers from the College of Medicine, Nursing and Health Sciences have taken a significant step forward in the management of gestational diabetes mellitus after a clinical trial involving pregnant women provided new hope for expectant mothers suffering the condition.
