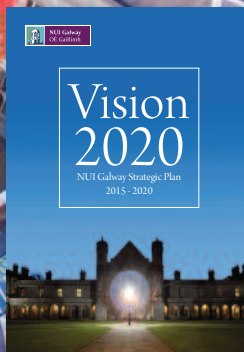
VISION

Research Impact

The University has prioritised five cross-disciplinary research themes, building on international success to date.

These are:

Applied Social Sciences and Public Policy

Biomedical Science and Engineering

Environment, Marine and Energy

Humanities in Context, including Digital Humanities

Informatics, Data Analytics, Physical and Computational Sciences

NUI Galway's research is relevant to societal and economic needs. Its global reach is enhanced by the impact research is having in key areas of strength including:

Big Data: The Insight Centre for Data Analytics, with 400 researchers and more than 80 industry partners, is co-hosted by NUI Galway. It harnesses the power of data for many purposes, such as reducing energy consumption, maximising medical information or enhancing business performance.

Biomedical Science: Ireland's only facility for manufacturing adult stem cells for human trials is at NUI Galway. Through its clinical and translational research facility, co-located on hospital grounds beside the campus, biomedical research experts are advancing therapies for medical challenges such as stroke, Parkinson's disease, diabetes and cancer.


Digital Humanities and Archives: NUI Galway is home to a wealth of archival material dating back to 1485. In the vanguard of digital humanities research, the University is home to the world's largest digital theatre archive, that of the Abbey Theatre.

Health Promotion: The Centre for Health Promotion Research, the only one of its kind in Ireland, has World Health Organisation (WHO) status for its role in health promotion education and research.


Human Rights and Equality:

The Centre for Global Women's Studies is measuring the economic cost of violence against women and girls in countries around the world, while experts in international human rights law and disability law continue to inform policy at the highest levels.

Lifecourse: The Institute for Lifecourse and Society focuses on older people, children and families, and persons with disabilities. It is the first institution in Ireland to host a UNESCO Chair, advancing research and training in the areas of children, youth and civic engagement.

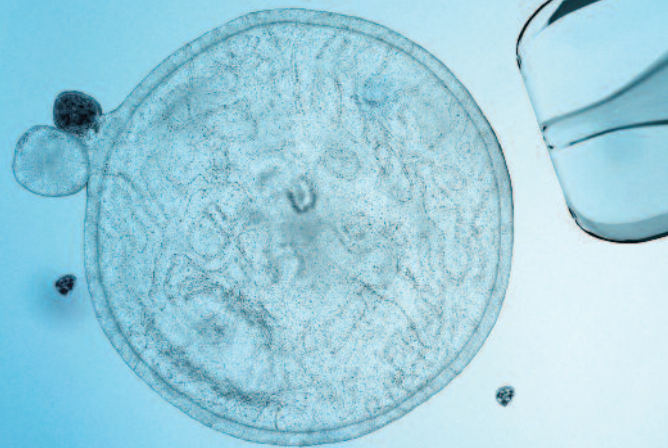


Med-tech: Galway is one of five global hubs, in a medtech market worth €95 billion annually in the EU. The CÚRAM Centre for Medical Device Research, with 500 researchers and 28 industry partners, is based at NUI Galway and is creating the next generation of innovative medical technologies.



Sustainability: The Ryan Institute for Environmental, Marine and Energy Research is contributing to the understanding of environmental challenges and marine ecosystems, and developing solutions in renewable energy and waste treatment.

Irish Centre for Human Rights: Recognised among the world's leading experts in human rights law.

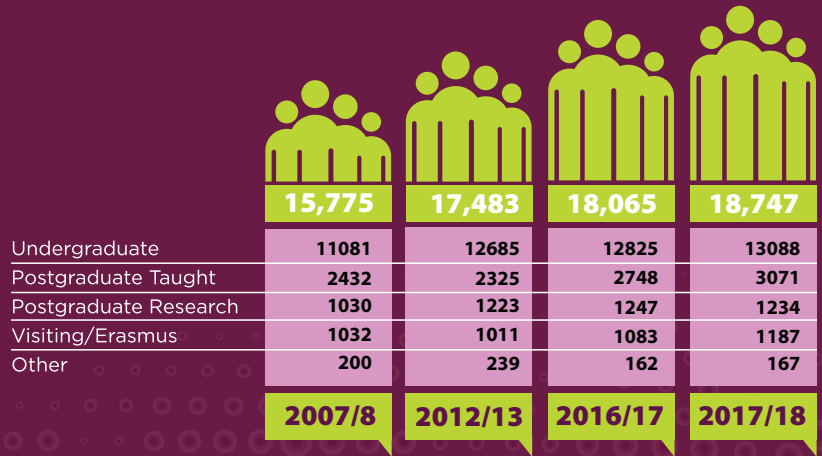

The University's proximity to the Connemara Gaeltacht – the largest Irish-speaking region – enables it to support the educational, economic and cultural needs of Irish-speaking communities in the Gaeltacht and around the world. The University offers a bilingual environment where the Irish language is regularly used in academic and social life on campus.

Sport

Sport is central to life at NUI Galway, and our sporting facilities are some of the best of any Irish university. We have fostered national champions and Internationals in Rugby, Rowing, Boxing, Swimming, Basketball, Athletics, Windsurfing, Climbing and Sailing amongst others.

Our athletes have achieved recognition in their chosen sports at Olympic Games, World Championships, University World Championships, European Champions, and Rugby Six Nations and as intercounty players in all five codes of Gaelic sport.



Clubs at NUI Galway include 27 Olympic sports, indoor and outdoor team sports, a full range of water sports, adventure, recreational and snow sports. From rowing to water polo, mountaineering to scuba-diving, ultimate Frisbee to 5-a-side soccer, there is a club for everyone at NUI Galway.



NUI Galway's elite sports programme for talented athletes includes coaching, access to our elite sports gym, and a package of sports supports.

NUI Galway rewards exceptional athletes, applying for undergraduate courses, with 40 CAO Performance Points.

A generous sports scholarships programme to help students with outstanding potential to achieve their goals, both in their sporting and academic careers.

Creative Arts

NUI Galway has an excellent reputation for supporting and developing the creative arts. The University is home to a unique campus-based active arts environment.

The University has a number of strategic partnerships with arts organisations at a local, regional and national level, including the Abbey Theatre, Gate Theatre, Druid Theatre Company, An Taibhdhearc: the Irish language National Theatre, the Burren College of Art, and the Galway International Arts Festival.

The O'Donoghue Centre for Drama, Theatre and Performance is a state-of-the-art teaching and performance space on campus. It hosts a range of productions from students, as well as touring theatre and dance companies.

The Arts Office hosts the Múscailt arts festival each spring, bringing new and original art, music, performance and spectacle to campus, while the Arts in Action series provides free weekly performances on campus throughout the academic year, while the Arts Office supports artists to bring a programme of original art, music, performance and spectacle to campus.



NUI Galway is home to a growing collection of archives from some of Ireland's most iconic cultural figures and institutions: including filmmaker, John Huston; writer, John McGahern; playwright, Thomas Kilroy; and the Druid, Gate, Lyric and Taibhdhearc theatre archives. Our project to digitise the Abbey Theatre's archive is the largest of its kind in the world.

The University supports a number of revolving creative residencies, including writers-in-residence, dancers-in-residence and sean-nós singers/dancers-in-residence

Location

Galway City, located on the West Coast of Ireland, sits on the River Corrib between Lough Corrib and Galway Bay and has a population of over 79,000.

Galway is a vibrant, cosmopolitan city steeped in culture, rich in folklore and famous for its cobble-stoned streets, quaint shops and charming restaurants. Known as Ireland's cultural heart, Galway is renowned for its vibrant lifestyle and numerous festivals, celebrations and events.

A UNESCO City of Film and home to the world-renowned Druid Theatre Company, Macnas Street Theatre Company and An Taibhdhearc, there is much to do in this wonderful city that has recently been designated the European Capital of Culture 2020.

Galway City is a gateway to the rural landscape of Connemara and Ireland's Wild Atlantic Way. The landscape leaves one breathless, from the prehistoric fort of Dun Aengus, to the Burren, an area of beautiful limestone landscapes in nearby County Clare.



The medical technology sector in Ireland is recognised as one of the five global emerging hubs and Galway is at the very heart of this development. As many as 18 of the world's top 25 medical technology companies have a base in Ireland and 50% of the 450 med-tech companies based here are indigenous.
