SDG Week 2025: Local Action, Global Change

SDG Week 2025 took place from 20–27 September at University of Galway, celebrating the theme *Local Action, Global Change*. A diverse programme of events engaged staff, students and the wider community in supporting the SDGs and highlighting our role as a National SDG Ambassador. Highlights included the inaugural Run into SDG Week, the Green Flag Raising Ceremony, student-led activities, research showcases and a Community Climate Assembly. Campus-wide consultation sessions also informed the development of the University's next Sustainability Strategy (2026–2030).

Community Climate Assembly

The Community Climate Assembly 2025 was held on 27 September at University of Galway, bringing together community groups, researchers, organisations and businesses committed to climate action. The half-day event featured themed discussions on water, mobility, food, wellbeing and nature, with community speakers sharing local success stories. An exhibition space and informal networking supported knowledge exchange, while an optional campus sustainability tour highlighted climate action in practice. The Community Climate Assembly was organised in collaboration with Aerogen, Atlantic Technological University, Corrib Beo, Galway City Community Network, Galway City Council, Galway Roscommon Education and Training Board,




Sustainability Engagement Fund - Peace

The Sustainability Engagement Fund 2025/26 supports initiatives aligned with the University of Galway Sustainability Strategy and our role as a National SDG Ambassador, with funding streams focused on Peace (SDG 16) and Green Labs (SDG12). **Peace awardees** are Sophie Sweeney and Anita Ferrara (College of Business, Public Policy & Law), Sarah Jenkins (College of Arts, Social Sciences and Celtic Studies), and Hugh Gately (Literary and Debating Society & College of Arts, Social Sciences and Celtic Studies).



Sustainability Engagement Fund - Green labs

Green Labs awardees are Claire Masterson, Coralie Mureau, Niall Belton and Oliver Carroll (College of Medicine, Nursing & Health Sciences), and Kiruba Nedounsejian, Indu Patwal and Darragh Mullins (College of Science & Engineering). Following discussions at the Green Labs Sustainability Engagement Fund launch, the Sustainability Office is now convening a Green Labs Forum on a regular basis. The forum provides a space to share ideas, experiences and best practice in sustainable laboratory operations. The next Green Labs Forum will take place on Tuesday 17 February 2026, 12.00–13.00 in the Biomedical Science Building Seminar Room.



Sustainability Schools Roadshow

The Sustainability Office, in partnership with CELT and the Community Engagement Manager, has been delivering a Sustainability Schools Roadshow across the University. These visits to School Board meetings provide opportunities to share current sustainability initiatives and gather feedback from academic staff. To date, the roadshow has visited 13 Schools, supporting dialogue on embedding sustainability within teaching, research and engagement. Further visits are planned.

Waterway Project

The Waterway Project is an EU funded climate initiative led by Galway City Council that explores how Galway's canals can generate renewable energy through small scale hydropower. The project aims to support local climate action while creating opportunities for skills development, innovation and community engagement. University of Galway is a core partner, contributing research, education and training through a Living Lab approach that supports upskilling in green technologies and shares learning with other European cities.

Submission to Ireland's Third National Implementation Plan for the SDGs

As a National SDG Ambassador, University of Galway has made a formal submission to Ireland's Third National Implementation Plan for the SDGs. Led by the Community University Sustainability Partnership (CUSP), the submission highlights the role of higher education institutions as key partners in delivering national and global sustainability objectives, reinforcing the University's commitment to sustainable development in Ireland and beyond.



Student engagement on sustainability

Student engagement remains a central part of the Sustainability Office's work across the University. Building on our student presentations during Orientation and International Student Orientation, we continue to engage with students through Climate Crew, master's programmes, student societies and visits to Colleges and Schools. These sessions raise awareness of CUSP, the Sustainability Strategy working groups and the



Sustainability Champion Digital Badge, while highlighting the many ways students can get involved and play an active role in the University of Galway's sustainability journey.

Innovate4Sustainability Hackathon

The Innovate4Sustainability Hackathon took place on 12 November 2025 at PorterShed a Dó, Galway. Students from across disciplines collaborated to develop innovative responses to sustainability challenges. Delivered by University of Galway IdeasLab, Atlantic Technological University (ATU) and with support from the Higher Education Authority, the event showcased strong student creativity, collaboration and problem-solving, highlighting the value of experiential learning in developing future sustainability leaders.



Climathon

Climathon Galway 2025 took place on 24 October at University of Galway, hosted by the Ryan Institute in partnership with the PorterShed and Galway City Council. Celebrating 10 years of Climathon Galway, the event doubled in capacity and included a poster showcase. The event highlighted the power of place-based innovation, bringing together students, researchers, entrepreneurs and the city to co-create practical climate solutions for Galway. Congratulations to winners Trade Tribe and runners-up Grá Greens, with all teams demonstrating strong innovation and collaboration.



Campus Wellness and the importance of connection

This has included the UG Model United Nations, which welcomes over 200 delegates across two 3-day conferences in Semester 2, as well as a rights-focused panel discussion and AI-themed debates, My plans as Sustainability Intern for Semester 2 include a Model European Parliament with ELSA and Feminist Societies, a debate between political party societies with Politics Society, and a University Forum platforming the voices of the student community before the University's governing authorities and offices, as I continue to concern myself with sustainability-related pursuits of democratisation and platforming.
